THE GRAND PRIX SERIES

Jack Lavety may have retired as Chairman but he certainly hasn't hung up his computer. Jack has shouldered the task of coordinating the Grand Prix Series as well as running another Sponsored Shoot!

Jack will be organising and circulating entry forms for the Grand Prix Series and also keeping track of competitors classification and

points gained in the series.


Please note that the Grand Prix Series includes 6 venues this year. Competitors completing 6 events in the series will drop their worst placing from the 6 events for the best 5 to count for the 50 Metres Championship.

Following on from the policy decisions made in 1986, DRUG TESTING

may be carried out at any Grand Prix meeting in 1987.

S.S.R.A. classification will be in operation this year. Competitors entering other than class 'A' will be required to submit a certified average. Further entries in the Grand Prix Series will be according to classification. After each Grand Prix, Council Members will meet to determine promotions and demotions, taking the standard of competition and weather conditions into account. Competitors will be notified of any change of classification for the next event in the series. By thus eliminating improper re-entry in the inexpert classes, it is hoped that this will encourage more entries from inexpert competitors. At the end of the season, this will also allow Council to assess the case for an S.S.R.A. 'X' class and also to review the classification boundaries.

Please note that the Caithness Grand Prix is planned for SATURDAY, 18th of July, with the Caithness Open Championship on Sunday 19th. This meeting will be confirmed as soon as possible.



Winter Competition Finals

The final of the **Speedway** will be held at Perth C & C Range, with their kind permission and cooperation, on Sunday 15th March at 11 a.m. This shoot, with its distinctive format, is always exciting and spectators and supporters are cordially invited.

The final of the 3-Positions Championship will be held at Linwood on Sunday 12th April. This final will be shot at 50 metres and again spectators and supporters are invited to what promises to be a final of high scores and great interest.

Irvine 1987.

Irvine is a hive of hustle and bustle at the moment. The range for the Scottish is about to be planted and work continues on the Irvine Shooting Club development, with attention now turning to the roof!

Irvine have been invited again this year to host a Grand Prix at the end of August in place of the second Denwood Grand Prix. Should Irvine be ready in time, there wil be 30+ covered firing points, in a range complex which also includes a 25yd indoor range with 25 firing points, which may also be used as a 10M air weapons hall, but not simultaneously. We should know by the end of June whether or not the Irvine Grand Prix is on, so watch for an announcement at the Scottish Meeting.

In the event of Irvine not being ready in time, Denwood have offered to host the Northern Grand Prix as usual.

Scottish Shooting Council Seminar

How many people in the S.S.R.A. (and outside it, for that matter) ask themselves why on earth it is that shooting seems to have one of the most complicated set-ups in terms of leagues, associations, governing bodies, competitions, etcetera? One N.S.R.A. person recently expressed the opinion that we seem to have everything except a governing body for standing-on-the-head-blindfold shooting. Shooters are so fed up with being asked to pay affiliations to large numbers of different bodies, that it is hardly surprising that the S.S.R.A., which is the only body recognised as governing smallbore rifle shooting in Scotland, has trouble getting more than 10% of Scottish smallbore riflemen to join. The situation is even worse if you want to take part in other forms of shooting. It was recently calculated that you could easily spend £70 a year in subscriptions over and above your club membership fee, just to be allowed to shoot in every target sport at top level.

This is one reason why I am organising a one-day Seminar at Glasgow University for the Scottish Shooting Council on Saturday 4th April, from 10 a.m. until 5 p.m. (approximate times). The subject will be The Future Organisation and Administration of Scottish Target Shooting and the aim will be to secure broad agreement on the benefits to shooting of a common membership, a common full-time administration, and a common approach to grant-aiding bodies, like the Scottish Sports Council. Full programme details will be circulated later in February. It may be necessary to limit numbers attending, in which case club and governing body officials will be given priority over ordinary members. The N.S.R.A. will be invited both to attend and to speak. A Discussion Paper will be circulated by the Shooting Council to the S.S.R.A. Council in early February, so if you wish to have further details about the proposals, contact your local Area Council member.

National Facility - Manor Powis

For the next couple of months, make sure that you touch wood as often as possible. Few of us dare to hope too much at the moment, but there are at last signs that the cherished dream of the Shooting Council, a National Shooting Centre at Manor Powis, on which Scotland could host UIT Championship events, may be off the drawing board and on the landscape soon. I have been, and will be, doing everything I can to help the progress of the project.

Firearms Law Advisory Leaflet

On the eternal subject of firearms and the law, I have produced an advisory leaflet for the use of clubs, as there have been several conflicts lately between clubs and the police, the central issue being how much control clubs are obliged to exercise over whom they allow to shoot, and the conduct of shooting within clubs. The leaflet is at present with the Scottish Office and the Association of Chief Constables for comment, and hopefully approval, before publication.

PROFILE - Stuart Guild

Our new chairman, Stuart Guild, by profession the Senior Partner of a firm of Solicitors in Edinburgh has a wealth of experience in the shooting world. A member and past Captain of the Watsonian Rifle Club, he started target shooting in his school days with the Shooting VIII at George Watson's College and, apart from an enforced break in which he saw service with the Royal Artillery in Burma and the Far East, he has been involved in shooting for his club and at county level.

The Scottish Training Squad - from the inside.

Many will ask - those who turn up to the A.G.M. anyway - when they read the S.S.R.A.'s statement of accounts; "What is the point of spending so much money on such an unruly rabble?"

The plain fact of the matter is that Scotland badly needed an injection of potentially good enthusiastic young shooters — the encouragement of those who will form our natioanl teams in the future — and some not so young. So two years ago, the Scottish Training Squad was formed.

Scotland's shooting teams can no longer exist solely on prone shooting, so the squad provides a chance for the increasing number of 3-P shooters to exchange ideas and training techniques to the benefit of all. This does not mean to say that the prone shooter does not benefit from the sessions, for if he/she/it comes to the sessions with an open mind and a willingness to listen and contribute, he has the opportunity to benefit from others views and insights; not only into the techniques involved, but also into attitude and approach, which is so important to anyone wishing to advance in the sport.

Is the squad appreciated by those invited to join? The very fact

that many go to great trouble to be at Meadowbank, where the sessions take place, for the early start must say something for their enthusiasm. This is highlighted by the fact that in the bad weather during January, the Aberdeen contingent travelled through very bad conditions to arrive on time.

At this point, we should like to acknowledge the efforts of the coaches - Harry Milne, Adam Gordon, Geoff Webb, Anne Hamilton, Cyril DeJonckheere and Ian Robertson - who have put a lot of effort into preparing (?) for and getting to each session.

When will you see the results of this expenditure? Some of you have already seen. There was last year's Devon Match where the team won the 3-F event the first time fielding a 3-F team, and there's the increasing number of quality shooters from whom to select teams for the Home Countries Internationals.

If anyone knows of somebody whom they think would benefit from and be interested in the squad as described, they should contact Harry. Every year others are invited to join as the more experienced members leave having benefited from their term in the group.

GROWING UP, FALLING IN LOVE, AND BLOOD ON THE TRACKS or The 1987 Scotland Volunteers' trip to the Intershoot in the Hague.

"Rogelund? That's Norway, isn't it? When is it, and how much will it cost?"

"Next week, and about £250 plus pocket money", came the reply. I gulped, fought off the temptation to go AWOL and run up an unauthorised overdraft, and said "That's a bit too much too soon, I think. But isn't there one in Holland in February?"

A few weeks later, at 8:05 a.m. in a rather dog-eared Dutch sports hall, struggling to keep the terror out of my voice, I said to Cliff Ogle, "Whatever else happens, tell them I was here". On my left was Dirr of Austria, on my right, Hauburg of Germany, both of them 585 men. My main recollection of the next two hours and a bit, is that I might as well have been picking up my air rifle for the first time. Shortly afterwards, I was relieved to discover that I had avoided coming last, narrowly beating Cliff and a one-legged man representing the British Amputees. Our Scottish team had come a resounding last in the team competition, a full 20 points per man behind Luxembourg.

Room for improvement, thought we. In fact Ian Gibb, our very valuable guide and senior team member, managed to improve significantly on the second day. Stephen Dunlop, Alistair McDonald, myself and Cliff, all failed to prove that our first showing had simply been a question of acclimatisation. Hillenbrand of West Germany won the rifle matches with 595/591 (the current world record is 594): his face suggested it could have been better but then, of course, Slotbloom was ill, and Heberle, Stenvaag and Nipchow were resting up after the Luxembourg shoot.

We agreed that as we obviously weren't there to win, we must be there to learn, and the first thing we learned was that Swiss and Austrian girl shooters look a bit like their skiers, only nicer. As this was sinking in, we also discovered that they could shoot as well, as a Swiss girl with one of the worst positions I have ever seen methodically put together 393x400.

I fell deeply and instantly in love with Gudrun Sinnhuber of Austria, while Cliff lived up to his surname whenever he saw one of the German female juniors. Ian was heard to admit that he couldn't take his eyes off one -or was it all- of the Swedish ladies' pistol team. McDonald and Dunlop have so far refused to reveal their hearts' desires.

We also learned that it doesn't take superb facilities to organise a competition like this. Inverclyde is big enough and good enough as a venue: it all boils down to getting the other teams to come, and to finding the expertise to run the event properly. With the new finals, there is at least the prospect of attracting some TV coverage, and the mandatory civic receptions are not hard to come by for major events. It would be nice to think of Scotland getting a shoot like this accepted on the international calendar, before it becomes too full.

Then there was the return journey, which was a pain in the neck for us, but not half so much as it must have been for the person who commited suicide by throwing himself in front of our boat train at Leiden (the station before we were due to get on). Thus unhappily a two hour wait became a four hour wait, while we joined everyone else on the station in a mass wild goose-chase fed by rumours in the form of tannoy announcements saying that special buses, trains etcetera, had been laid on for us. Eventually we were bundled into taxi cabs and driven at high speed, at the cost of Dutch Railways, to the Hook of Holland where our boat had been patiently waiting for an hour. A mere 16 hours later, and we were back home, on terra firma and down to earth.
