EACILITIES EACILITIES

Denwood :

The Pavilion and indoor range are ready for the final finishing touches and decoration. The walls have been plastered, the internal partitions and kitchen area have been finished and firing booths and tables have been painted. The steel bullet catcher, which is a one-piece construction to cover standing, kneeling and prone as well as all the indoor pistol shooting disciplines has been assembled and concreted into position. The size and weight? About $26 \times 8 \times 8$ feet and one and a half tons of iron!!

The main outdoor range of 20 positions (with 1.5m spacing) shooting through both 50 metres and 100 yards is complete and awaits The 20 huge target supports with about a half ton of certification. concrete in the base of each are in place and both the enormous covered firing points and the assembly areas have been finished with a tarmac surface. This will be a real ALL-WEATHER range.

Money is still a big problem although the financial support has been superb with a rush of new Foundation Club membership applications now that the dream is becoming a reality. MORE are still needed!! Although the Aberdeen & District Association has been a constant source of support and funds, they are starting to feel the effect. If there is ANY way you can help, then please get in touch. We still need funds to complete the 50m pistol and rifle range and to try and afford a metalled surface for the roadways.

Overall, the appearance of the Centre is staggering - it beats Those of you who came anything I've ever seen, even on the Continent. to the Scottish Meeting in Aberdeen will not be too surprised as they will have seen just how well our Development Officer (Bon Accord's Adam Gordon - didn't you know?), can design, organise and complete a project!

Lothian :

Hawthornden is under threat of closure. It would have been closed by now but seems to have had a temporary stay of execution in that the ranges are available for hire, but the Club has ceased to exist as from the end of August pending the sale of the premises.

Lothian's development of an outdoor range complex at Cousland near Dalkeith is progressing. There have been a number of objections to the planning application, mainly from the residents of the village of Cousland which is a quarter of a mile away, on the grounds of noise. The organisers' committee is confident that these objections can be overcome, as can be the other objections on potential traffic problems, and that the project will proceed to a successful conclusion. Funds are still urgently required, however, and the Lothian Committee is actively pursuing fund-raising possibilities.

Drugs Information

A question was raised at the AGM as regards individuals' eligibility for international selection whilst taking banned substances which had been prescribed for maintenance of life. After some discussion with Doping Control and amongst ourselves we have come to the following decision.

At NSRA competitions shot under NSRA rules:-

If a person declares the partaking of banned substances to the NSRA before the meeting and is accepted for the meeting and that person also declares, before the meeting, to the SSRA that they are routinely taking banned substances, they may be considered for National Team selection. The reasons for taking the substance would normally be supported by that person's doctor.

At competitions shot under UIT rules:-

A person taking a banned substance under any circumstances is not eligible to shoot or be selected for the National team.

Your Secretary has a list of banned substances and small credit card size summaries. He is also the drug control liaison officer for the SSRA. If you have any queries do not hesitate to contact me and I'll see what I can do.

As an example of how easy it is to be caught out:-

Flu and cold remedies
Medecines that would result in a positive dope test include Contact 400,
Day Nurse, Benylin (check ingredients), Mucron, Bronchipax, Sudafed,
Simutab, Vicks Cold Care, Actifed and Procol.

Major ingredients to avoid, and this is not all of them, when purchasing over-the-counter remedies are ephedrine, pseudo-ephedrine, phenyl-propanolamine and codeine. Check the packaging and you'll be surprised how your favourite cold cure can make you a cheat in the eyes of doping control.

The rule is : if you are in doubt, tell me before you shoot and not after the test results. They do not miss much.

Attention All Women Shooters!!

Did you know that, at the 1994 Commonwealth Games to be held in Vancouver, the Canadian hosts are to offer separate events for women. For the first time ever, subject to demand, women will have their own prone, 3-positional and air weapons matches rather than be competing for places in mixed teams. The Scottish Commonwealth Games Council have for places in mixed teams. agreed to expand the shooting team by a maximum of two places if women a suitable calibre are available either in the rifle events or in the shotgun or pistol events offered.

Although many women shoot well prone, some are not aware that, in international events shot under UIT rules, women may only use a standard rifle. This basically means a weight limit of 5.5kg for the rifle (including sights), no butt-hook and a limit to the additions which may be made to the foresight tunnel. In addition a bipod may not be used while shooting and no adjustment may be made to sight-raising blocks or the cheek-piece between the various 3-P disciplines.

At present there are very few women shooting 3-P or air rifle seriously (remarkably few shoot prone standard rifle seriously too), so the opportunities are there for anyone wishing to take up these events. if Vancouver in 1994 seems a bit soon to reach that standard then think of Adelaide in 1998.

3-positional standing is very demanding both physically and mentally but The 3x20 at is an event where women can and do take on the men and win. Bisley this year was won by Karen Morton with a score of 565.

If you are interested at all in taking up 3-P or air rifle or are interested in training for the 1994 Games, we'd like to hear from you. UII Equipment

A favourite topic of conversation amongst shooters is equipment. For most shooters, the main source of equipment is the NSRA - despite the demise of the Scottish Depot at Milnathort. However, many people have been asking - at Grand Prix meetings and at training sessions - about alternative manufacturers and sources of shooting jackets.

The jackets generally available through the NSRA and assorted British manufacturers range from the old "Tenex" style jacket which provides very little help to the shooter, through the double canvas and leather jackets made by the likes of Tucker, Michael Clothing and Possibles.

The NSRA also imports an Australian made jacket. Prices for these vary between approx. £100 and £200. These jackets represent reasonable value /cant'd

for money, and are used successfully by many shooters - including a few
regular faces in the Scottish Team.

What the NSRA doesn't provide is any of the really top class jackets — mainly European — which are used by most of our current Internationalists, and all the top class shooters on the European/World stage. There are numerous makes including Sauer, Gehmann, Anschutz, Kusterman, Mouche (all German), Truttman (Swiss), Stenvaag (Norwegian), Marksman House (Korean) and Thune (Finnish). Currently the Mouche and Thune kit is most in vogue, with a move from leather to double canvas having taken place in the last few years. These jackets all come in at around £250 — £350. They have the advantage of being UIT legal and provide the maximum support allowed under the rules.

There is no "best" in this game. What matters most is that the jacket fits properly. There is no point in having an expensive jacket that doesn't fit.

I.S.A.S. Indoor Meeting Dortmund

This was the SSRA's first trip to this International Meeting in Germany. Scotland was one of ten nations from Europe taking part.

The team was made up of 7 shooters, 1 junior, 2 for 3-P, 4 for prone with 2 shooters doubling up for Air Rifle. The 2 3-P shooters entered for the prone shoot after we arrived in Dortmund when I found there was range space available. I decided that they should have the opportunity now they were in Dortmund.

The journey to Dortmund turned out to be a marathon due to fog at Edinburgh Airport on the Monday morning. We were due to take off at 0840 but were about three hours late in getting away and had to travel via Heathrow instead of Birmingham not arriving at our hotel in Dortmund until about 2100 hrs.

The team were able to practise on Tuesday and with the range not being very busy they made good use of the time. The lighting was the aspect of the range that took some time for the shooters to come to grips with. By the end of the session all the shooters seemed satisfied with their day's work.

Wednesday, none of the Scotland team were shooting and full advantage was taken for a good look round Dortmund.

Thursday, the first day for any of our team to shoot in competition. Our junior, Lance Graham, was the shooter to have the honour in the Junior 3-P shoot. Lance took a little time to settle into the prone section of this competition but finished better scoring 381. The standing part of this match was the most difficult for Lance but considering this was his first taste of International competition he performed quite well. His kneeling section was not up to his best, he knew himself that this had not been the best that he was capable of. Even so I think the experience will have been very useful to Lance.

There were two other British Juniors there and their results were about the same.

Friday was the day for our 3-P shooters to start their competition. The two shooters, D McIntosh and R Sellar, had an 0800 hrs start time which meant an early start from the hotel. Both these shooters had prepared well for this shoot. In the prone section of this shoot both the shooters performed well finishing with 388 which had them well placed in the competition. In the standing section they again returned the same score 354 - this was again a reasonable result. In the kneeling section of the match, Donald scored 380 to give him an excellent total of 1122. Ronnie finished with 374 for a total of 1116. This represents a very good performance from both shooters in such a high quality competition.

Saturday, English Match today with all team members shooting the first detail at 1400 hrs and the last one at 1800 hrs.

It had been three days since the prone shooters had had any practice, but they were all in good spirits and confident of giving a good performance. Lance the junior shooter again was not happy with his result but maybe he had set his aims just too high. /cont'd

The 3-P Match :

This year's Bisley programme included an official 3-P International for the first time, with team medals and bars being awarded. This match is shot concurrently with the 3 \times 40 British Championship on the opening Saturday of the meeting. Shooting 3-positions on Century range, even with tarpaulin sheeting enclosing the back of the firing point, is a stiff test of shooting position and technique and the phrase 'standing one's ground' has special meaning. Keeping a steady position and aim when buffeted by wind has become a regular aspect of 3-positions at the National Meeting.

Scotland's selection this year were Ian Shirra- Gibb as Captain with team members Bill Murray, Robin Law and Donald McIntosh. All three shot well to produce a winning team score.

The absence of an England team nomination lowered euphoria only momentarily when close examination of the result sheet showed that, even if England had nominated their leading scores, Scotland would still have won!

Ronnie Sellar, though not in the team, deserves special mention for taking 4th place.



STSE_Training_Programme

In the aftermath of the 1990 Commonwealth Games, the Scottish Target Shooting Federation (STSF) decided to look into all aspects of coaching and training that could improve the performance of Scottish shooters at events of this calibre.

The Scottish Sports Council this year made money available for "Special Projects" by generating bodies which were specifically targetted at improving the performance of the top level shooters on the International scene. The STSF took the largest slice of this cake, and some of the money went towards the SSRA/SARPA/SPA team which competed at the ISAS Open Meeting in Dortmund.

The STSF reserved some of the Special Project money for use on psychological training. One of the first problems with getting involved with this field is finding a "friendly" expert - such as Paul Amison who is used by the NSRA. As part of a two-day coaching session organised by the Scottish Rifle Association, Dr Richard Cox, a sports psychologist based at Moray House in Edinburgh, ran a session explaining what he felt he could bring into a sport like target shooting and giving an introduction to some of the techniques he has at his disposal. In order to get a feel for what Dr Cox has to offer, Vice-Chairman Cliff Ogle, along with Scottish Internationalists Gordon Winch, Donald McIntosh, Robin Law, Shirley Smith and Billy Mitchell, attended the session at Redford Barracks in Edinburgh.

Dr Cox presented himself very well and impressed the SSRA representatives with how quickly he had picked up the basic problems inherent in shooting sports. What was said appeared to go down well with the other association reps too although some seemed a trifle bemused by how much attention was already being paid to mental preparation by our top shooters. Everyone was very positive about how the session went and the general impression was that Dr Cox or one of his colleagues could help bridge the gap between being in the top team at the next games and winning a medal.

The SSRA will support any further STSF moves to take this form of coaching further.
