The Denwood Shooting Centre re-opened at Easter after a complete re-development. Adam Gordon deserves fulsome praise for the project he has brought from a glint in his eye to completion. Denwood Mark II (BSA users please pardon the pun) will stand as an inspiration, and object of envy, to many other regions who wish for a decent shooting facility.

It has been a good year in International Matches, too. The results in the International Matches this year demonstrate the strength of the Scotland teams. Scotland won the main Home Countries events at both Lauder and Bisley and the Scotland 3-P team have set a high standard in this match, winning 3 times in its first four years.

While this Newsletter, as ever, is later than the editor would wish, it does give us a chance to report on the team performances at the Mini-Games where a medal was won in every small-bore rifle event and two in air rifle.

What is the price of all these successes? Nothing is free and the Association, and the Denwood Range Association too, are having trouble making ends meet. The recession is not helping but target shooting as a sport can no longer subsist on subscriptions and fees which invest nothing for the future. All Associations and clubs have to face up to the real cost of shooting. It seems expensive compared to 10 years ago but, compared to other sports such as golf or squash, it's very good value.

Late Extra: John Oliphant's achievements this summer defy description. The latest news from the NSRA is that he has been selected directly into the GB Prone 'A' Squad after coming second in the Selection Trials at Bisley last month.

#### John D A Oliphant

1992 has been a year John Oliphant will not forget in a hurry. Any one watching John's career over the last few years will have realised that something was about to come good, but how good would they have dared to guess?

Things started well for John at Lauder, attended by the Oliphant clan en masse, when he picked up the first comp in 'X' class in the Agg. on the Tuesday. On Tuesday afternoon, he made his only real slip for the week in letting comp. 3 get away from him. By Thursday, he was on winning form again with comps 4 and 5 under his belt and paused briefly to pick up the Freuchie Wilkinson Sword while waiting for the Agg. results - a 9 point win over Gordon Winch. On Friday he made top equal score in the Scotland team before the Haig Final in which he took a single point win from fellow-Anglo Bill Brown.

At Bisley, John settled to a more deceptive pace, but nonetheless telling for that. By Thursday evening, he had won the Championship Aggregate. He then cruised through Friday, helping Scotland to a most memorable victory in the Home Countries International. Celebrating Scotland's "Away" win on Friday evening left John's shooting faculties unimpaired as he took the Roberts, the British Long Range Championship, to clinch the "Quad!" Somewhere along the way among lesser trophies, he also picked up another Wilkinson Sword, the NSRA's one awarded for the best combined score in the Agg. and Roberts.

Unfortunately, work and family circumstances have not allowed John to take up other team places this year but he did take part in the National Squad Selection Trials in which he was second with a 594 and 591, both Commonwealth Games qualifying scores, and so can expect a place in the GB squad next year.

During the summer, John became engaged to his girlfriend, Louise. Louise has visited Lauder and Bisley with John this year and so must have a good idea of what she's letting herself in for.

Congratulations to John on a most remarkable season and very best wishes to him and Louise for a very happy and prosperous future together.

#### The Cost of Amateur Sport

Over the past few years attendance at the Association AGM has been very poor. In several cases the meeting has barely had a quorum of 25. Council appreciates that, for many, the distance to Perth is too great to travel for the AGM and, for this reason, wishes to communicate some of the business of the forthcoming AGM to you for your consideration.

For many years now the Association has been under pressure to increase membership fees by the Scottish Sports Council (SSC) and, to some extent, by the Scottish Target Shooting Federation (STSF) because our membership fee was ridiculously low. On your behalf, we have argued that the membership should stay reasonably low because of our position in relation to the NSRA, i.e. while membership of the NSRA is compulsory, membership of the SSRA is not. To some degree, this has been accepted by the SSC although they still believe thath a realistic membership fee for a governing body such as ours is in the region of £15 – £20. For comparison, the other governing bodies for shooting in Scotland charge the following membership fees:-

SARPA (air rifle)	£5
SCTA (clay target)	£15
SPA (pistol)	£12
SRA (full-bore)	£15

As you can see, other than SARPA, we have by far the lowest membership fee. Three years ago, the AGM of this Association voted to introduce a bloc membership scheme so that, where all the members of a club were required to be members of the Association, half price membership would be given. The intention was to increase the number of members by making the membership fee more attractive. While the intention was laudable and in line with Council's desire to increase the number of members, we have not seen any increase in membership. In fact all that seems to have happened is that clubs where the Association was already well represented have converted to bloc membership with a resultant loss of membership income.

Understandably the current economic climate has affected the Association both in its effect on the members willingness to rejoin and on the Association's activities. Price rises have hit the Association for items such as postage, photocopying and stationery and these have been absorbed by the Association itself. Obviously if the membership fee does not increase and the number of members does not increase then we have a problem in meeting these increased costs.

As you will probably be aware the Association also receives funds from the SSC in grant aid as a governing body. Historically the SSC have funded bodies such as ours by meeting any deficit in their incomes by grant aid. Grant aid has always been given according to a submitted budget and plan, with the level of aid given being restricted to a maximum matching the body's income. While this Association has enjoyed low subscriptions, it has also endured a relatively low level of grant aid compared to the other shooting bodies. In this respect, we have shot ourselves in the foot.

The SSC has changed its grant aid structure over the years and deficit funding is no longer used. Over the last three years, the Association's grant has been pegged at £1950 per annum. The SSC's emphasis on funding moved to encouraging sport for all and has now progressed beyond this to promoting performance and excellence. This has resulted in the special grant which the STSF now receives for training for the next Commonwealth Games.

All of this means that our income has remained fairly static and the expenditure has increased which in turn means that membership must regrettably be increased.

In the last two years certain of the Association activities have had to be restricted due to lack of funds. Rather than show you a breakdown of what has been spent recently, (which you may find in the accounts of the Association), I thought it might be helpful to show you how the Association budget is allocated:

As you can see, the only activity which generates income is the competition programme. All fundraising which is undertaken, apart from the 100 Club, is committed to the Games training fund to help meet our £ for £ committment to the Special Project grant from the SSC. If we allocate the SSC grant of £1950 to the training programme, we still have to find the cost of the trials and the cost of the international programme.

In previous years, we have relied on the generousity of council members and training squad members in donating back their travelling expenses for attending council meetings and squad sessions respectively and this has amounted to a substantial sum. However, in the current economic climate we cannot expect this to continue and indeed the donations for the current year have fallen. Any donations which we do receive release money towards the international programme. Any shortfall must either be made up from Association reserves, increased fundraising or from the shooters themselves. Those who read "Money Matters" in the last newsletter will know how Council views the last of these options.

Bearing all of the above in mind, Council has been forced to recommend that the membership fee be increased substantially. However we have also considered what the members get from the Association and would like to propose the following membership package to be phased in over the next two years:

1 Individual membership fee of £10.

2 Bloc membership fee of £7.50 for 1992/93. Bloc membership to be abolished from 1993/94.

Membership of Scottish Teams and training squads will be restricted

to individual members only.

4 Individual members will receive a personal copy of the newsletter sent to their home address.

5 All winter competitions will carry a £1 discount for individual members. Summer competitions will carry a £1.50 discount for individual members.

6 For 1993/94/ onwards, entry to the Association Medal competition will be restricted to individual members and will be free.

This may seem drastic and expensive but I would like to draw your attention to one or two other factors which you should consider.

- An individual member entering all prone competitions will make a saving of £5 on winter competition entries and £7.50 on Grand Prix entries with a further saving of £7 on 3P competition entries. This more than covers the increased membership fee.
- Pederation at British level will mean that all participators in the sport will be required to affiliate to their national governing body to participate. As the NSRA will cease to exist in its present form, membership of SSRA will be compulsory. The STSF and SSRA preferred funding structure of GBTSF is that membership is collected at national level and a proportion of this passed up to the GB body for the funding of international teams and other general activities. This will undoubtedly mean increased fees and the abolition of club membership. It will also mean increased work for this Association through its volunteer council.
- 3 Scottish Shooting has enjoyed a number of successes in recent years at the national meetings. As you will see from the results elsewhere in this newsletter, national teams have won Home Countries internationals 9 times in the last 4 years. The 3-P team has won the 3-P international in 3 of the 4 years which the match has been run.

This proves that the training programme which the Association has run over the past few years has been effective and that the international match programme has given shooters more appropriate experience for competing at a higher level. This combined with the excellent performances of small bore shooters at Commonwealth Games level has raised the profile of the sport and as a result has helped the shooting sports as a whole obtain a large grant towards training for the next Commonwealth Games.

4 The Association cannot continue to fulfil its role as governing body for small bore shooting in Scotland with the present level of membership fee.

I hope that the above has gone some way to explaining the present financial circumstances of the Association as well as some idea of the problems we face. Unfortunately I will be unable to attend the AGM to answer any further queries personally but there will be other Council members present who can. Please give careful consideration to what has been suggested and I hope that this will allow you to give it your full support. Even if you cannot attend the AGM, Council would like to hear your views on these proposals.

#### Squads for 1992-93

This is one of the key functions of the Association and the mark of its success is coming home from Mini-Games with a medal in every event and the flush of wins at Home Countries International in the last few years. It does, however, take a lot of hard work, particularly on the part of the coaches.

What do they cost the Association? The training and coaching programmes are grant-aided and so we are able to offer travel assistance but we also have to cover the cost of hiring ranges and providing targets and any other equipment used at the sessions.

What do they cost the shooter? Approximately half your travel costs, your ammo and meals.

For the coming year, the Association will be organising three training squads.

The Intermediate Squad

Formerly the Training Squad, this has been running for many years now with three or four sessions every winter at approximately monthly intervals and it's most satisfactory to think back to some of the earlier days when John Oliphant and Gordon Winch to name but two were in this group. However, in the last year or two, the squad coaches and Council have become very concerned that members seem to be regarding this as a group which can be attended on a one-off "come as you please" series of separate events. It has always been the coaches intention that the four sessions form a progressive programme and, while they recognise that family circumstances and other contingencies will mean that not all the members can attend all the sessions, the attendance patterns of the last two years has completely disrupted their planned programme.

This squad is intended to help shooters to realise ambitions beyond a recreational interest and to make a committment to a shooting career. A particular aim is to help shooters new to outdoor shooting to get to grips with conditions and to get started with outdoor meetings.

For 1992-93, John Simpson, who is qualified as Coach Educator under the new GBTSF Coaching Scheme, will be organising the Intermediate Squad, with the assistance of other coaches. Dates are planned for the 6th December, 18th January, 15th February and another in March, still to be finalised. Sessions will be run at Linwood near Glasgow and Denwood in Aberdeen.

The Advanced Squad

Formerly known as the Team Squad, the Advanced Squad is directed towards shooters who have set their goals as reaching national teams and GB Squads in a two or three year timescale. The objects of this squad is to improve our national teams by focusing on the members of those teams, or shooters showing the potential to earn a place in those teams.

The Association seemed to focus more in the Training Squad in past years and only one or two sessions were run for the Team Squad, concentrating on dealing with wind and weather conditions at National Meetings and also inviting Ian Shirra-Gibb to work with 3-P shooters. Many of our best shooters do not train and rely on continuous competition, postal or otherwise, to maintain their performance standards. For the coming years, the Association

plans to broaden the interest of this squad for advanced shooters to help them train to improve beyond these levels.

Cyril De Jonckheere, also a Coach Educator, is taking over this squad and hopes very much for a positive response from suitable candidates with ambitions for an International shooting career who are prepared to commit themselves to a train. The Squad will focus on helping shooters in constructing their own development programme and working through them. Cyril will be inviting shooters into this squad during the winter but if you particularly wish to be included or want to ensure you won't be overlooked, write to him, including your experience to date, with your personal bests, current goals and shooting plans up to the end of the next outdoor season.

The Games Squad

Commonwealth Games is the highest standard of competition available to shooters representing Scotland and this squad was formed in 1992 with the express purpose of preparing the shooters who will go to the next Commonwealth Games in Victoria, British Columbia, Canada in 1994. Already, they are less than two years away and final selection trials are less than one year away (Aug. 93). This squad is supported by Special Project funding from the Scottish Sports Council which has to be matched £-for-£.

Harry Milne has been appointed as Rifle Discipline Coach for the next Games and his plans for the squad are to provide training and match opportunities not otherwise available. Sessions will focus on the shooters own training programmes, including technical training, mental training, physiology, bio-mechanics, training and competition plans, etc.

The Association paper "Commonwealth Games, Information for Members" which was included in the June Newsletter set out the procedures for selecting the Games Squad and the Games team.

These squads are an important part of the Association work. Everyone can help support them by continuing to support the Association by subscribing and with your generosity when a fund-raiser comes your way.

#### Denwood Shooting Centre Update September, 1992

The Centre is up and running. There are problems; some of the aspects of the building have still to be put right, the costs are higher than our estimates and there are difficulties in getting committed help for the regular running of the centre and maintenance. However, there is nothing we can see that cannot be overcome with a little effort. At the moment, an incredibly active but tiny team (Adam Gordon, Ian Baird amd Bill Jaffray) do the bulk of the work with support from a dedicated few who help greatly as and when they can.

So what do we have and what's in it for you?

We have three ranges; Two outdoor ranges with 20 firing points and enormous all-weather canopies and individual spacing of 1.2 metres allowing us to mix LH and RH shooters and an indoor range designed to the highest specification.

The Number 1 range is on the old site and is certified for prone rifle only. The Target supports are designed to allow direct forward access and mixed 100 yards and 50 metres shooting simultaneously. Sockets are fixed for wind flags which can be either UIT 'strips' or NSRA 'wind-socks'.

The Number 2 range is of similar construction but it is certified for all .22" disciplines (PSK rifle and pistol) shooting at up to 50 metres.

The Number 3 range is an 8 point indoor range with individual booths for each shooter and variable intensity lighting at 25 yards. Again, the range is certified for all .22" disciplines. The pistol target holders are roof mounted and pull down for use and the air rifle and air pistol catchers swing down on beams.

All of these facilities are available to SSRA/NSRA affiliated shooters by arrangement. The Centre is administered by the Denwood Range Association although the resident club, Bon Accord, has control during the Winter season. The Association actively seeks other users and would welcome other Clubs or Associations who would like to use the facility on a one-off or regular basis.

The SSRA holds two of its Grand Prix meetings plus and two of its 3-P Grand Prix Meetings plus some of its training and coaching sessions at the Centre. The Aberdeen DSRA holds its own meetings and is changing the formats this year to appeal to a wider range of shooters. The Bon Accord club hold a week long Open Meetings during the Winter.

Sadly, we lack the money to complete the outdoor pistol facilities hence if you have ideas, please get in touch.

So if you fancy shooting here, keep an eye on the SSRA Calendar and Newsletters for the Meetings or telephone me to arrange a visit.

#### Scotland v Police Athletic Association Lauder, Friday, 26th June, 1992

This match was suggested during May and was quickly arranged for the Friday between the Police Championships, normally held on the Thursday preceding the Scottish Meeting, and the start of the Championship Meeting. The NSRA very kindly gave us their permission to use the range, providing we did not get in the way of their final preparations. The suggested format was an English Match and a Scottish Match (60shots at 100yards) for teams of 6.

Team selection for the match was governed by those who were able to travel to Lauder for the day and who were also able to take a day off work at rather short notice.

Notwithstanding these difficulties, a team was formed and the match was scheduled for 10 o'clock. The P.A.A. team had all assembled early, as they were lodged locally for their meeting. By 10.00am, only five of the Scots team had arrived and were champing at the bit. It was beginning to look as though Anne, who had come to help with scoring and range duties, would have to get out her rifle. As she was on her way back from her car with her kit, the sixth man arrived, Alasdair Horne from Edinburgh. His target was already on the frames and the match got under way. Alasdair proceeded to get the team off to a flying start with a 198! The others took a little time to settle down but easily overcame the opposition's advantage of having shot on the range the day before to establish a comfortable lead after 50 metres.

After a short break for lunch and to review the scores, the match resumed at the 100 yards. The wind condition became markedly stiffer and scores progressed to double figures for each card and, while the Police recovered some form, the Scots won the 100 yards by 11 points.

Both teams expressed considerable satisfaction in the event and a wish that it be repeated annually.

# **OBITUARY**

### **England Smallbore Rifle Team**

After a long illness and declining health, the England shooting team finally expired today. The achievements of its long and vigorous life are too many and boring to mention, but include coming second in the Home Countries International at the Scottish Meeting on a number of occasions.

Its passing was being mourned outwardly this evening, particularly by its Celtic adversaries who interrupted their festivities to point out that the trouble with an opponent dying is that you can only celebrate it once.

The end came peacefully, on the firing point at Bisley at about 3.30 pm on Friday the 14th of August 1992. The best efforts of some of the finest wind-surgeons in the country proved unequal to the task of reviving the patient and at 4.30 the scorers switched off the life-support machine and the death certificate was signed.

The team's last words: "Wait - go - wait" will be remembered in the history books as the despairing gasps of one who sees the end in all its bleak suffering, a just retribution for a lifetime of cruelty and oppression.

Already rumours are circulating in some circles that, in spite of the clinical pronouncement of death, a certain Dr.Frankenstein, Jr., has been called in to deep freeze the team in an attempt to find a cure for its chronically bad shooting some time in the distant future.

And the story gets even more bizzarre: reports from undisclosed sources state that the team's stainless steel barrels have been bugged with a mysterious metallic virus, nicknamed McMichaelangelo, which is timed to strike during the Home Countries International every year until the end of the Millennium.

I'll skip the travelogue, suffice to say that we all arrived at the small-bore range at Comber, a little south-east of Belfast, on the Friday afternoon, where practice facilities were available. The small-bore team trained for an hour or so on the outdoor range, and Robin Law and David Rattray practised air rifle indoors, after which we went to deposit our weapons with the local constabulary in a police station not far from the hotel. We had to do this each evening for overnight storage and collect them again in the morning.

After checking—in at the Stormont Hotel, where the entire 35—strong Scottish team was staying, we attended a reception hosted by the Northern Ireland Sports Council in Belfast for the competitors of all the participating countries. After this, I attended the managers' meeting where the firing—point draws for all the squadded competitions were made. It was announced then that equipment control for the 3—Positions competition next morning would not be a formal affair, but spot—checks would be made. This was because the storage and collection arrangements with the RUC had only just been completed, and it was judged that there would be insufficient time for all the participants to collect their weapons and still allow time for the pre-competition weapons control session.

The 3-P got under way at 0930 on a cool and overcast Saturday morning, with a light wind from the front right. It was to get cooler throughout the day. After the prone, Murray and Law led with 395 and 393 with NI's Ogle lurking on 393 as well. However, the standing, as is usually the case, produced a completely different leader-board, and it was Robin Law who came through to lead by 19 with a 370. Murray slipped back to 4th with a 343 and three Englishmen (Potts, Langridge and Parr), came through to take 2nd, 3rd and 5th spots. Donald McIntosh had a 344 to take 6th, and positions 2 - 6 were only separated by 9 points. Ogle appeared to be out of it with a 333. The best kneeling went to England's Ian Potts with 380, but Robin Law's 377 was quite sufficient to give him the Gold on 1140. Potts maintained his second place with 1124, and Langridge his third place with 1120. After the standing, Bill Murray was hopeful that his kneeling would boost his position into the medals, but it was not to be as the cold got to him and he lost several shots due to involuntary let-offs just because of shivering. He estimated that cost him at least 10 points, and his eventual score of 1115 and 4th place was very disappointing both to himself and to the team, who had been counting on Bill for a Donald McIntosh finished with 379 kneeling for 1114, one point behind medal! Murray, and 5th place. Three in the top five isn't bad though. Our fourth competitor in this event, Andy Coates, is a relative newcomer, and, apart from shooting in the much more informal match against the Army earlier in the season. this was his first big representative match. He shot a little below his average.

but achieved his stated aim of 'not coming last' by a considerable margin. One to watch for the future, and this was an extremely useful experience for him.

The Women's 3-P match, which consists of 20 shots in each position, was shot concurrently with the two standing and the first kneeling details of the Men's 3-P competition. Both our competitors started off neck-and-neck, with 195's prone and 166 for Trish and 167 for Shirley in the standing. However this put then only 4th and 5th at this point and really good kneeling would be required to lift them into the medals. Shirley, who had been very disappointed with her standing, proceeded to do exactly that and shot a super 190 for a total of 552. This tied for 2nd place with England's Lindsay Volpin but Shirley's last kneeling string of 94 was good enough to give her the silver medal, with Julie Malcolm of Wales out in front with 560 to take Gold. Trish came in a creditable 5th with 547. Two medals in the bag after two comps.

The Air Rifle was being shot at the Downshire Club in Hillsborough as an unsquadded competition due to the large numbers of 3-P-ers doubling up. We had two such and they shot AR on Sunday. Our other two, David Rattray and Gordon Winch, shot on Saturday morning. David is a specialist in this discipline and had won this event at each of the two previous games, so we were expecting big things from him. He came back with a 576, well below his best, and he was not happy about it. Gordon shot a 553 which he was personally quite satisfied with, but would get nowhere near the medals. David was resigned to seeing his crown disappearing England's way as they had a pretty strong team. Our hope was that Robin Law would keep it in Scotland. However, the English stars one by one dropped below David's score, and even Robin failed to make the top three. The last detail came with Bill Murray to shoot. He started off steadily with 96, 95, 96 but would have to improve on that slightly to get a medal. He was shooting slowly, and realised he would have to speed up. The next string was 91 - disaster. The next was a 94, and the manager was resigning himself to an also-ran placing. However, Bill had other ideas, and shot a superb 98 for his last string to count-out England's Eric Lively for a third place. Gold and Bronze - over-the-moon time!

That all took place on Sunday afternoon, after the Prone events in the morning. We had high hopes of medals here too, with all our team in good form. The start was delayed by about an hour due to misty conditions, but the delay was not announced until the preparation period had commenced and the shooters had had a chance to look through their sights. A delay of one hour was unilaterally decided by the range officials, but after 45 minutes, as some shooters wanted to commence and some did not, a meeting of all the team managers decided that shooting would commence immediatley. Conditions had improved marginally but some competitors were still not happy. All the Scots shooters had wanted to start though (previous experience at Wick, Perhaps?).

In the Men's event, all our team members were struggling to keep up with the pace except Gordon Winch, who finished second on 592, one point behind Jersey's Steve Le Couillard and counting-out John Dallimore of Wales with a 99 on his last string. Alister MAckenzie was 7th on 588, Bill Murray 9th on 587, and Tom Hodgson 10th also on 587. Getting all our men in the top ten was an improvement over the English, who were 6th, 8th, 16th and 17th! ANOTHER medal.

The Women were shooting concurrently, and our team of two were keen to get in the medals. Previous form had put Shirley Smith slightly ahead of Trish Littlechild, but in the end it was Trish who came good, finishing second with 586 behind Wales' Sarah Hartop on 590. Trish's second card of 182 let her down. Shirley started off below expectations and, although she picked up in the middle card, she could not maintain the momentum and finished 5th on 583. Trish was overjoyed, as we all were at her success. If she ever manages not to get too nervous when she starts scoring well, then she'll be a force to be reckoned with.

The Scottish Small-bore and Air Rifle teams won six medals: two Golds, three Silvers and one Bronze, and ended up the most successful section of the Scotland party. The others were a Silver in the rapid-fire pistol and a Bronze in the centre-fire pistol competitions. Scotland were second in the medal table, with 8 to England's fifteen.

The only sour note came at the presentation of the medals at the banquet on Sunday evening. As the presentation wore on, it became obvious that no medals were going to be presented for the Women's prone event, and, right at the end, almost as as afterthought, engraved glass tankards were presented to the top three. This came as a bitter disappointment to Trish Littlechild, as no warning of this had been given to us, and she was, naturally enough, expecting the same award as all the other successful shooters. The story given was that, as Women's Prone is a new event in the NEXT Commonwealth Games, it had no CURRENT status, and was being run as an 'unofficial' event. This was news to us. Representations are being made to the NI organisers to produce a medal for Trish.

Apart from that, the whole trip was a most enjoyable and successful experience, and I congratulate the winners. Next year's event will be held at Bisley.

#### J P (Phil) Liddell. 1906-1992

#### Individual Leagues, 1992-93

The Association offers members two individual leagues this year, one prone and one 3-P. Both share the structure set out below, different only in course of fire, number of shooters per division and number of rounds.

This is not the usual league format and everyone shoots against everyone else in every round. No one gains free points against no-returns.

Individual Prone League

- 1 In each round, all competitors will fire two cards. Rounds will be fired fortnightly with an extra round thrown in around Christmas.
- 2 Entries to be ranked according to declared averages and will be split equably into at least two divisions of about 8 depending on numbers entering.
- 3 In each division, the highest score (x200) for the round gets  $\underline{n}$  points, second gets  $\underline{n-2}$  points, third gets  $\underline{n-3}$  points, etc, down to the last who will get no points where  $\underline{n}$  is the number of returns in the division that round.
- 4 The entry fee is £3.00.
- 5 Stickers will be provided. Send a stamped addressed envelope for results.

#### Individual 3-Positions League

As above except:

- An indoor (15/20/25 yds) half-course (i.e. 20 shots in each position) each month from November to March (more or less) (i.e. 5 rounds).
- 2 Entries to be divided according to declared averages and will be split as equally as practicable in to at least two divisions of about 6 depending on numbers entering.

Entries close on 31st October, 1992. Please get in touch (031-453-4083) and let us know the entry is on the way if you have any difficulty compiling averages, etc.

As the entry will be split into divisions, there is no reason why inexperienced shooters should not enter. You don't have to shoot all your cards at the same time or range but normal NSRA conduct and witnessing rules apply.

#### The Matchplay League

The Matchplay League is being run as usual this winter, with the addition of awards for leading averages in each dividion. Entry forms are out now. Your club/match secretary should have one.

#### Scottish Small-bore Rifle Association 1992-93 Winter Competitions

Association Silver Medal and Engraved Salvers with Junior and Veterans Classes. A two-stage postal competition in four classes, with the best ten qualifiers (and equal) in each class contest the Final for the Association Silver Medal. Each class winner receives an Engraved Salver. Each stage is a three-card set (one-hour).

Speedway Competitions for the Bill Dick Memorial Trophy and the Boston Bowl. A two-stage, two-class competition with a postal qualifying stage of 5 cards (not a set). The two classes are Open and C & D competitors only. The open final consists of the best 16 qualifiers regardless of class, and the best remaining 16 from C & D contest the C & D final. Ties for final places will settled by countback (Numbered stickers). The Finals will be shot on a central range and will be a round-robin competition of 20-shot shoulder-to-shoulder matches in groups of four different shooters each time so that all shoot against all. The Open winner takes the Bill Dick Trophy, the C & D winner takes the Boston Bowl and there are cash prizes for the first four places in both finals. The top eight in the Open competition eligible for team selection go automatically into the Scotland team for the Annual Indoor Postal match with North Island, New Zealand. Selection for the remaining seven places is based on current season's performance in the Medal, Speedway, Individual and Matchplay leagues, Daily Record, News of the World and Vandeleur. Scores at indoor meetings and previous NZ Matches will also be considered.

<u>CanDicap for the CanDicap Quaich.</u> A two-stage, CYOH postal competition for C & D class shooters only, a set of three cards (one hour). Handicap must be not less than 5 per card and the same throughout. The best 20 and equal twentieth qualify for the postal final of a further set of three cards.

Three-Positions Competition for the Watsonian Trophy and 3-P Championship. A three-stage, unclassified competition. The first two stages are each a half course (20 shots per position, not a set) and are aggregated to select the 12 qualifiers for the final, a FULL course, shoulder-to-shoulder at 50 metres in April, under UIT regulations.

<u>Individual Leagues for Prone and for 3-Positions.</u> Where scores from last year are not available, entrants are required to submit averages for these competitions. The 3-P league takes the form of a half-course per month between November and March inclusive.

#### Classification for prone competitions.

Classification is based on the average of the best 10 of the last 12 indoor competition cards (1989 series targets). A Club Official must verify the average on the Entry Form.

Class A: 98.0 & above Class C: 93.0 to 95.9 Class B: 96.0 to 97.9 Class D: below 93.0

Junior: under 18 on 1. Jan. 93 Veteran: over 60 on 1. Jan. 93

#### Eligibility.

These competitions are open to all. Those eligible may choose to become Individual Members of the Association for the annual subscription of £10.00 or by Bloc membership (25% reduction when all eligible members of a club join) and pay lower competition fees, receive personal copies of Newsletters and vote at General Meetings. Only Individual members may claim discounts of £1.00 on all winter competitions and £1.50 on Grand Prixs during the summer season. All others may enter as Club members but may not claim any discounts.
