This newsletter, along with the enclosed documents, should bring you up to date with the activities of the Association over the last few months. The one major outstanding item is, of course, the 1993/4 accounts. John Silcox is working away on these, along with the current year, with assistance from Shirley McIntosh and these will be presented to the membership at the AGM, probably in an un-audited state, but hopefully ready to be handed over to the auditors on that day.

At the AGM a number of changes will take place within the Association. Anne Hamilton resigned as Secretary at the end of September for personal reasons, although she has continued to do a lot of work in getting the winter competitions set up. Chairman Alistair Mackenzie and Vice-Chairman Donald McIntosh are not standing for re-election either. With an under-strength council this year, the future of our Association looks a little bleak, especially when the demands on the time of the council members grow year by year.

Despite that, a topic for the incoming council members to address is that of the structure of Scottish shooting. Currently the SSRA, through the STSF, represents the view of Scottish shooters in discussions with the Scottish Sports Council, the Scottish Office, Police, Army and various other agencies. With the exception of a hardcore of individual members however, most shooters in Scotland are not affiliated to the SSRA in any sense, and therefore have no say in what directly affects them. Indeed some regard the SSRA as little more than a club for (aspiring or current) international shooters.

The ramifications of this may be huge, for example, at one stage we were being told that at Scottish clubs and associations would not be eligible for National Lottery grants if they are not affiliated to an STSF member body. Meanwhile the NSRA, to whom most Scottish clubs and counties are affiliated, represents our interests at GB level, but often with agencies who have no role in Scottish affairs (eg the Home Office who only cover England & Wales). The attached diagram, produced by Bill & Anne Hamilton to illustrate this problem to the Lothian county exec., shows the problem - clubs and counties cannot affiliate to SSRA and have no formal say in what it does. Is the answer to change this?


Part of the four year plan submitted to the Sports Council in 1994 identifies a process of consultation with Scottish clubs and counties, potentially followed by constitutional re-structuring of the SSRA, as an important aim. If you, your club or your county / league have an opinion on this then now is the time to start thinking about it. The prospect of having a conference towards the end of next spring to discuss these issues has been raised within the SSRA council already, and hopefully this can be achieved in the forthcoming year.

ISAS Dortmund, 21st to 26th March 1995

A small team of six shooters and a manager attended the ISAS competition this year. This is a short report on the highlights and 'moments' of the trip. The team was, as usual, well managed by Angus Dick, and on behalf of the shooters I would like to thank him for his efforts in organising the trip. The team consisted of prone shooters Bill Hamilton and Tom Hodgson, Donald McIntosh and Ronnie Sellar did the senior prone, 3P and Air Rifle, Tricia Littlechild did the women's prone, 3P and Air Rifle and Andrew Rycraft shot the junior AND senior Air Rifle.

Monday, 20/3/95

The team assembled at Edinburgh Airport for the 11:30 flight to Dusseldorf via Birmingham. The team was due to meet at 10:00 to check in early for the flight but on arrival we were told that there was a problem with this flight and we would be re routed through Heathrow. This meant catching the 11:00 shuttle. This produced various moans and groans as people predicted doom and gloom in the area of lost luggage.

The clock reached 10.45 and worry was now showing on the face of the Team Manager as one of his team (Tricia) and Cliff Ogle (representing Northern Ireland) had not yet appeared. They just made it in time as we checked in our luggage and some jokingly said fond farewells to their rifles and kit. Tricia was not looking well and was apparently suffering from a dose of 'Ghandi's Revenge' after a dodgy curry on Sunday night. Due to the rather late check in we were going to be last on the plane so we proceeded with all speed to the gate. Donald and Ronnie got through first and decided to wait on the others in the upstairs lounge.

No one appeared!

What's happened?

Tom appears and announces that Bill, who was right behind Ronnie and Donald has been stopped due to the fact he has his bolt in his hand luggage and they won't allow this in the plane. Much hilarity ensues and a good slagging for Bill as he should have known better since Gordon Winch was caught the same way on a previous trip. Bill's hand luggage was duly loaded into the hold (by a man who had to run across the tarmac to catch the plane before it left) and we set off. On arrival at Heathrow Bill had to go and reclaim his hand luggage as it had not been checked through to Dusseldorf like the rest of the luggage and we didn't meet him again until the departure lounge for the Dusseldorf Flight. This time WITH his hand luggage as Heathrow security had let his bolt through!

We arrived in Dusseldorf late afternoon and duly went to collect our luggage. We waited..... and waited Eventually a BA employee appeared and asked who had travelled from Edinburgh. Several people gathered round (there were more than just our party) and heard that true to form, Heathrow baggage handlers had failed to put a single piece of luggage from the Edinburgh flight on to the Dusseldorf flight. This feat is even more staggering since some people have claimed it was the same actual plane that did both trips.

And so we were promised that our luggage would be delivered to our Hotel later that night as it was coming on the next plane. There was nothing for but to travel on luggageless to Dortmund. This happened to be a blessing in disguise as usually the worst part of the whole week is man-handling all the luggage on to and off of the S-Bahn train to Dortmund. In fact the outcome was so favourable we asked Angus if he could arrange for all future luggage to be lost in a similar manner.

The trip was completed by S-bahn to Dortmund then instead of the usual fleet of taxis to the Hotel, a leisurely stroll (bumping into Brian Woodall and Liz Cowell of the GB team on the way) and a tram ride took us to the Hotel Prodomo. As promised our luggage was delivered later that night with Lufthansa tags on it.

Tuesday, 21/3/95

Tuesday saw the first visit to the range since the new Sius Ascor targets had been installed in the 30 firing point 50 metre range. These targets at a cost of about \$6000 per lane had been paid for by the Town Council! This day was open for training for all disciplines and all the team took the opportunity to get used to the new target system.

Tuesday evening was spent in the Dortmund Pizza Hut on an 'Essen Ohne Grenzen' offer. That means eating without borders or limits and was basically eat as much as you like for 9.90 DM. All went for this deal except for Bill who stuck to a tagliatelle. Most people managed to get through a fair amount of pizza but not as much as a guy at the next table. He was HUGE!! A real couch potato who was well ensconced when we arrived and ate at least two pizza's worth while we were in the restaurant. Quote of the night came from Tricia who said that she didn't think it would be wise to offer him 'A wafer thin mint' (vis Mr Creosote from Monty Python's 'The Meaning Of Life').

Angus attended the technical meeting and was duly elected onto the Jury. This meant he had to wear a badge all week saying 'Dick Angus, Kampfrichter'.

Wednesday, 22/3/95

Wednesday is a pistol competition day and as a result usually free for all the rifle shooters but this year Angus had managed to arrange for us to train on another range in Dortmund. This range turned out to be just round the corner from the ISAS range! It is owned and run by the Nordlischer Dortmunder Schutzenbund (Northern Dortmund Shooting Club). It had eight 50 metre firing points all with Gehmann boxes and in a baffled very sheltered range. There was also a twelve firing point Air Weapons range which could be opened out into the main club hall to form a large function room. In addition a 100 metre archery range was 'out the back'.

During a break in training I got talking to some the club members who had turned up to let us in and shoot. This club has 600 members (yes you read that correctly 600!!!!) of which about 150 are active shooters (that includes archers). That leaves about 450 social members who don't shoot. I suspect this club has more members than the SSRA!! I then asked how many clubs there were in Dortmund.

Go on, have a guess !

There are thirty five clubs in Dortmund. Did you get close? Yes 35 clubs in a town that's about the size (population wise) of Edinburgh. We did find out that not all the clubs are this size (in fact it is the biggest) and that some of them are as small as 25 members (funny I thought that was a BIG club!).

One thing that we said that amazed the Germans was that we tended to have separate rifle and pistol clubs. In Germany all shooting is governed by the one national body (that includes archery). This gets rid of all the petty inter discipline squabbles that occur on such a regular basis in Scottish and indeed British shooting.

Getting back to the Air Weapons range. This was separated from the large club room by a partition wall which could be removed to make a large function room. This was necessary because the club regularly held social functions attended by up to 1000 people.

YIKES !!

This just goes to show how differently shooting is viewed as a sport in Germany. There's none of the bad image that the sport tends to have in this country mainly due to the likes of Hungerford. Shooters are seen as real sportsmen and not as potential maniacs and nuisances out to fire anything that makes as loud a bang as possible. It seems to me that shooting clubs in Germany are more like the bowling clubs in this country or the golf clubs. People who don't really play bowls or golf join for the social aspects. As a result facilities are in a different class ('streets ahead' would be an insult to the

Thursday, 23/3/95

Thursday saw the first shots in anger from the team as Tricia shot the Standard Rifle 3x20 competition. This did not turn out to be one of Tricia's better shoots. The rest of the team returned to the other range for practice.

Germans) and as a result of that so are their shooters (more on that later).

Junior Men's Air Rifle (37 entries)

Training over for the day, Donald and Ronnie headed for Dusseldorf Airport to meet up with Andrew Rycraft who was flying over on his own. Some time was spent, while waiting on Andrew's plane, conversing with our driver who spoke only scant English. Neither Donald nor I are very good at German either but we managed. He was very surprised to learn that clubs in Britain tended to be either rifle or pistol clubs but not

both. We tried to explain that there were a few exceptions (e.g. Dumfries) but we're not sure if the message got across. Back in Dortmund Andrew caused some confusion in weapons control by having two air rifle start cards. One for the senior and one for the junior event. At one point the weapons control officer was about to tear up the senior one until Angus pointed out that the cards were for separate competitions. This seemed to satisfy them and both cards were duly stamped. The confusion is that normally you are allowed to shoot either the junior or the senior events but not both. Strictly speaking the rules were being bent but no-one seemed to mind in the end.

With a match the next day in mind both Donald and Ronnie decided that pasta was the order of the day and ordered the Tortellini in the range restaurant. Huge plates soon came forth and having devoured them the lads retired early.

Friday, 24/3/95

"What time is it ?" "Are you sure we have to get up now ?" "That can't be the time already !"

Yes its now 05.00 hours and Donald and Ronnie have just been wakened by the trusty alarm clock. Guess who's got a seven o'clock start! Remember that Germany is an hour ahead of us so this is really 0400 UK time!

"Are you sure the clock's right ?"

The early start didn't really do either of them much good. Both would say they could have and probably should have shot better.

Meanwhile at the top end of the competition things were hotting up. 1169 lead the field and 1159 was required for the final. We have a very long way to go !!!

Saturday, 25/3/95

Saturday morning and Bill and Tom are in action at last. Neither were happy with their shoot. Bill especially as he managed to cross shoot on his last string which of course under UIT rules is ten points off.

Donald and Ronnie were next and things looked promising after 20 shots (quote from Janet Howden "Who's this Sellar guy on top of the leader board ?"). Both Donald and Ronnie had managed a 199 start. Donald kept this going for another 20 shots before

falling away to finish on 593 and a creditable 3rd equal (unfortunately counted out to 11th). Ronnie however crumbled and fell away to 588. Two other Scots, Bill Brown and John Oliphant, who were part of the British team also had 593 and managed to squeeze into the Final. They went into the final fifth and eighth respectively and ended up fifth and fourth.

The womens prone was also shot later in the afternoon. Tricia did not look at all happy with her scores.

Sunday, 26/3/95

Another early start today as Andrew, Donald and Ronnie are all on the 8.30 detail. German clocks also went forward this morning so it was really 7.30 UK time (6.30 GMT!!). Donald did not have a happy time only managing 550. Ronnie fared better with a 570. A 90 for his second string spoiling a series of good strings.

The performance of the day was by Andrew who set a new Scottish Junior record with 567. Not a bad effort for your first visit abroad.

The gulf between UK air rifle shooting and the continental standard was shown by the scores achieved today. The best UK shoot was by Ian Potts with 572 followed by Ronnie on 570. The highest score shot in the 60 shots was 597!! This was achieved by TWO people. Unfortunately we all seem to be missing the same page of the results, thus the half blank table. A score of 592 did NOT make the final!!

Tricia shot the womens air rifle at 10.30 and suffered from being stuck in the smaller back range where the atmosphere of a big shoot was not quite there. She also had the unusual experience of the girl next to her having her pet dog curled up in her kit bag for most of the shoot.

These shoots showed how seriously this sport is taken in Europe. The crowds watching the Air finals were large. There were lots of youngsters running around collecting autographs and the atmosphere was electric.

With the shooting finished it was time to head for home. Angus had managed to arrange a minibus to take us to the airport. On arrival we were all relieved to find that we were not to be re-routed through Heathrow.

Our luggage was checked in and as we waited on the last of the guns being taken away we were approached by an Airport security official. He took Angus away to look at a bag which had aroused suspicion. Angus returned to announce that is was one of Bill's bags and could he go and explain what it was. It turned out to be his scope.

And so we came home without much further ado.

Conclusions

The SSRA have been sending a team to ISAS now for 5 years. With a few exceptions, performances in those 5 years have not improved as much as we could have expected. In fact with the exception of the three 593 scores in the prone this year (two from Scots in the GB squad) and Andrew's 567 performances could be said to be poor. Why is this?

If I knew the answer then perhaps my performances might have been up to scratch but they have not. I suspect its something to do with the amount of exposure we get to this level of competition. An event this large is very rare in Britain never mind Scotland. Like any other competition it takes time to get used to it. Perhaps once a year is just not often enough.

Another problem I suspect we have is in putting in high scores. Due to the weather conditions we have in Scotland we are not used to scoring much over 590. As a result when we are in a position to shoot 595 plus then the tension sets in and we lose the place. This is something we have to get over quickly as 595 really won't get you very far in the top competitions.

NSRA Competitions Report

One of the SSRA's Life Members, Adam Gordon, won the "Daily Record" short range Scottish Championship this year. While perusing old copies of The Rifleman at Denwood one wet Sunday afternoon I noticed that Adam had won the same competition exactly 30 years ago, having to complete two tie-shoot sets in addition to the normal three stages - and all without dropping a shot. His 1500 ex 1500 beat Jim Manson - then with Cawdor but still shooting with Elgin - by one point. While the targets have changed twice since then, that was quite some achievement. I don't know how many other times Adam has won the Dragon Bowl, but that result really stuck in my mind, and was in the middle of the period when he shot for Great Britain in the Pershing Match in the USA (1963?), won the Earl Haig (1964?) and was took part in the first ever shooting events in the Commonwealth Games in Jamaica (1966). We had better watch out for him next year...

Shirley McIntosh won the Individual Short Range 3P Championship, helped by the fact that defending champion Robin Law didn't enter.

Robin Law & David Rattray took 2nd & 3rd in the British Men's Air Rifle Championship, with Shirley McIntosh & Lynda Marlow 5th & 8th in the Women's respectively.

Despite having a dreadful aggregate in Lauder, Hugh Simpson jnr was a very popular winner of the Earl Haig Scottish Long Range Championship, beating three times winner Gordon Winch and Sinclair Bruce in a tie-shoot. Another former Haig winner, Will Low came out of retirement and promptly won the Daily Telegraph. 1994 Sgian Dhu winner Jenny Littleford of Strathallan School won the junior title, with the junior team going to George Watson's College. Bill Brown won the Class X agg, James Brown and Vidar Nilsen doing the same in classses B and D respectively.

Most of the Scottish club competitions have gone the way of Bon Accord, with them winning the Scottish Cup over the 1994/5 winter season, the Scottish 100yds club team championship (the ICI Challenge Trophy) at the Scottish Meeting and Division 1 of the Scottish League over this summer - the latter for the 20th consecutive year. Dumfries spoiled the full set by taking the Scottish 50m club team championship (the Pullar Targe), also at the Scottish Meeting.

Stirling Royal Infirmary flew the flag in the British short range championships, winning the "News of the World" short range team of six in a shoulder to shoulder final in Bedford, as you have probably seen on the cover of the latest Rifleman. I understand that Bon Accord and SRI were also at least semi-finalists in either (or both) the team of four and team of eight, but I don't know how much further they got. One of that winning Stirling RI team - Robin Law - also helped another club, Glasgow Rail, to win Division I of the Winter Air Rifle league - believed to be the first Scottish club ever to have done so. E U Alumni have held on tightly to the trophy for the highest placed Scottish team in the Women's league although they didn't manage to defend the Division I title this year.

So far the honours in the NSRA Scottish County trophies have been split between Lothian & Aberdeenshire with the former winning the trophy for the top Scottish team in the Inter-County short range league, and the latter the trophy for progressing the furthest in the Inter-County KO. The results for the remainder of the 1995 Inter-County competitions (such as the BSA Cup, County Cup and the women's equivalents) are still to be announced.

Lothian also won a few of the British competitions - Division 1 of the Inter-County 3P league for the third consecutive year and the Inter-County Air Rifle competition at the first attempt being the most significant.

The Provincial Cities title has spent the last ten to twelve years bouncing in between Edinburgh and Aberdeen, but this year both got it wrong and it has escaped to Torfaen in Wales, with Aberdeen reclaiming the trophy for the highest placed Scottish entry. Edinburgh shot in the Commonwealth Cities match - open to capital cities of the Home Countries and provincial capitals in Canada, New Zealand and Australia - for the first time in many a year, although the result is still to be received.

E U Alumni won the British Club 3P Championship at the Bisley meeting - and have won it every year they have entered. Concurrent with that Lothian won the corresponding County Championship with Robin Law and Ronnie Sellar taking 1st and 2nd places respectively in the Individual Championship.

Also at Bisley, Cliff Ogle won his third Prone Aggregate and his fourth combined 3P & Prone Aggregate. Cameron Ferguson won the A class aggregate. Tricia Littlechild was 3rd in the Women's 3P Championship, with Shirley McIntosh 2nd in the "Flowers" Women's Prone Championship (although she shot it at Lauder). Bill Brown, Robin Law and Barbara Mackay made the final of the Roberts, coming 8th, 9th & 11th respectively. Robin never stood a chance, having won the second stage.

Also in the Bisley results was a mention for a Scottish Olympic medallist. No, not Alister Allan but John Kynoch who took a running target medal in 1972 and was placed third in the British 50m running boar championship this year.

Territorial Army Competitions

Martin Sinclair, who will win his first Scottish "cap" at the Commonwealth Championships in India next month, is also a Captain in the TA. In a very successful year he has won their Short Range and Long Range Prone Championships, along with their 50m 3x40 Championship. He was also placed 2nd at the Inter-Services Prone Championship in September, behind Sharon McGregor of the RAF who has just been selected for the GB squad.

Interestingly enough, Martin's prone partner in India is Gordon Winch, a former TA member who has also won at least some of the same events.

Northern Ireland International Match Comber, 2nd - 4th June 1995

The sensible 3-P shooters (is there such a thing?) travelled by SeaCat to Northern Ireland the day before the first match, and were joined early on the Friday morning by Lynda Marlow who had made it as far as Stranraer the previous night (well she did start the journey in Holland) and to be honest we shouldn't have bothered. Poor performances all round meant that only two of us made the final, and the team

In reviewing the match, council have undertaken to provide clearer guidelines on what is required of the Captains and Secretaries along with a clearer statement of the conduct expected of team members. The substitution performed when Gordon arrived late was covered by precedent, but the whole issue of shooters confirming availability and when team members must be on the range will be clarified before next year.

SIUS ASCOR

Over the last couple of years, a number of Scottish shooters have encountered the latest in target technology - the Sius Ascor electronic scoring system. These have been seen recently in Dortmund, at the German Shooting School in Wiesbaden and at various World Cups & European/World Championships. Here Ronnie Sellar describes what it is all about.

The system consists of three major parts and lots of cabling (all neatly stored in conduits). At the target end is a box containing the sensors. This box has interchangeable front panels in a cream colour for both rifle and pistol 50 metre targets. The aiming mark is formed by a hole in this panel which has a rubber sheet behind it. This rubber sheet is used in the case of challenges to see where shots have gone.

The shooter has on the firing point a small monitor (monochrome, green screen) which shows the scoring rings and a list of the last five shots. This monitor also shows whether the system is in 'sighters' or 'match' mode. A button is attached to this VDU which allows the shooter to switch between a view of the whole target and a view of the centre out to the seven ring.

The third and final part of the system is the control panel used by the range staff. This panel has a box for each lane under the control of this panel (each panel ran eight lanes). Above the panel was a display which showed the last shot score on each lane. Each box on the panel allowed the range staff to change modes on each lane (at a signal from the shooter), to monitor each lanes shots (by using the same type of VDU as on the firing points) and to record each lane's shots on a printer for use in classification.

In 'match' mode a total for each string of ten is printed on that lane's printer and on the VDU on the firing point. All shots appear on the VDU as they are fired as a green disc in the place the shot landed. As the next shot is fired this disc is replaced by a cross and the next shot appears as a disc. A group centre marker also appears. This helps in centering sights. The screen can be 'cleared' by changing from the detail seven ring display to the large display and vice versa. When this is done only the last five shots appear on the new display. The group centre marker however still applies to all the sighters or all the match shots. Not clearing the screen means that at the end of a prone match there will be 59 crosses and one disc on the screen.

International Competitions

An exhaustive list of international performance by Scots in GB teams is not possible, as the NSRA have failed to issue any scores for international matches all year. Robin Law was the first away, attending the European Air championships in Finland in February. Shirley McIntosh added Central America to her list of continents, with World Cups in Cuba, Germany and Italy and European .22 Championships in Switzerland. John Oliphant & Bill Brown attended the ISAS match in Dortmund as part of the GB team, and were also at the Hapoel Games in Israel in June. Bill also managed to shoot in a World Cup in Japan, when he happened to be in the neighbourhood and happened to have his rifle with him...

Scottish Records

Enclosed with this newsletter is a complete set of Scottish records as currently recorded by the SSRA. The NSRA have changed the format of a number of their competitions this year. As fas as I know, the changes are as follows:-

All club teams at The Scottish and The National Meetings are reduced from four to three members.

The Inter-County 3-Positions League is reduced from 6 to 4 team members.

Division 1 of the club Air Rifle league is reduced from 40 to 20 shots per team member per round.

The Inter-County Air Rifle Championship at Aldersley is increased from 4 to 5 team members.

The Inter-County Air Rifle league is reduced from 40 to 30 shots per team member per round.

The Inter-County Air Rifle competition is changed from 6 shooters/40 shots each to 5 shooters/60 shots each.

This means that a number of record categories become obsolete, and the last record scores in these categories are shown. I gather that there a number of other competitions going the same way, if the NSRA Rifle Committee gets its own way.

If you think there is anything missing, or that you have got better scores in any categories, then please get in touch with Donald McIntosh, 100/10 Easter Warriston, Edinburgh, EH7 4QZ and let him know. Note that evidence may be required!

GB National Squads

Recent National Squad trials at Bisley resulted in some very good performances, or so we thought. It turned out that the marker had used the wrong gauge, and the re-issued scores are somewhat lower. As a result Robin Law returns to the men's .22 squad - where John Oliphant & Bill Brown remain. Shirley McIntosh & Tricia Littlechild also remain in the women's squad. Susan Bell has been omitted despite coming 2nd in the prone trial.

Commonwealth Games Qualifying Scores

The June newsletter contained a table of qualifying scores required for the 1998 Commonwealth Games. There were a number of errors in that table as Anne didn't have a full set of results to work from, but here is the correct version. STSF still have not made a definitive statement on what the qualifying score is (ie before or after final) and there will be some further discussions on that topic over the next few months.

- the pairs events are concurrent isn't as bad as it sounds. The team leaves Scotland on the 17th of November, with Angus Dick as small-bore rifle discipline manager. Tony Lithgow of the Scottish Clay Target Association is in overall charge, with SCTA and SPA also sending

representatives. There are no NRA style full-bore rifle events in these championships, but instead there are UIT 300m events - Free Rifle Prone and 3x40 as well as Standard Rifle 3x20. The Scottish Rifle Association, who are the governing body for these events, have declined to take part, as none of their shooters appear to have UIT legal equipment, never mind the ability to shoot competitive standing. Donald McIntosh - non travelling reserve for the Air and small-bore 3x40 was given the chance to take part in these events but without financial support has been forced to turn down the opportunity. It is still possible that these 300m events may be included in the 1998 Commonwealth Games in favour of the NRA target rifle event, in which case we may see some of our UIT shooters moving up in calibre. We will keep you informed as and when this situation is clarified.

NSRA/Eley Inter Region Match Bisley, 11th September 1995

One of the tasks the SSRA is asked to perform by the NSRA is that of Regional Squad coordinator for Scotland. This is quite separate from Scotland Team Squads, and applies to residents of Scotland who have GB National Squad aspirations. This activity involves selecting a team to compete in the annual NSRA Inter-Region match, which is sponsored by Eley, at Bisley on the day before the National Meeting starts.

The event consists of Women's & Men's Prone & 3-P, team & individual events - all shot on Gehmann boxes on Rimfire range. With current National Squad members barred from competing, we could not field a Women's team but had a Prone team of Donald McIntosh, Martin Sinclair & Cliff Ogle, with Cliff & Donald also shooting in the 3-P match.

The results that were produced seemed a little generous at the time and given the farce of the GB squad trials a month later, are very suspect. However, what they did produce was 1st place for both our teams, 1st place for Cliff in both events and 2nd place for Donald in the Prone. Eley provided prizes, including a full box of 5000 Match Extra (Eley obviously reckon Regional Squad people aren't good enough to need Tenex), half of which went to the Scottish squad members. The results have still not been formally published, but here are our scores.

experience level of our teams is becoming dangerously low. Apart from old war-horses like Cyril De Jonckheere, who must have well over 40 'caps', Sandy Reid and Robin Law who have both shot in these matches many times before, the other seven members of this year's team could probably only count about 15 Home Countries matches among them.

Don't get the wrong message here, though. I am absolutely certain that those who do represent their country in these matches perform to the very best of their abilities. This is exemplified by the fact that one of this year's new 'caps', Cameron Ferguson, was the team's top-scorer and I congratulate him on that achievement. The point I am making is that Scotland does leave a lot of its best shooters north of the border. Compare this team with recent teams from the 'Scottish': only two from the Blairgowrie team of 1993 and only one from this year's Lauder team were members of the Bisley team this year.

However, the NSRA has Women's Match relaxed their rules on eligibility for the HC matches so that a team member does not have to have entered the meeting to be able to shoot. This means that on payment of the registration fee only a shooter could shoot in the match without having done the Aggregate. The SSRA's current rule for selecting the team is to take it directly from the Aggregate with little room for manoeuvre. Perhaps the Council might like to reconsider its policy here to be a little more flexible. There was a case in point this year when a shooter in Class X who might reasonably have been expected to shoot well enough to qualify for the team did not make it as he was unable to shoot one of
