

94/95 Chairman's Report: Alister MacKenzie

Heopened by thanking the past committee for their hard work, in particular the treasurer. He updated the meeting on facilities and reported that Seat Hill will not be the site of a National facility for Smallbore Shooting.

In 1995 two projects in Fife were put forward as possible sites for regional facilities one by Cluny Clays the other by Kinross & Milnathort Smallbore Rifle Club. The SSRA and the Fife & Kinross Rifle Association were supporting the latter. We were supporting the development of a National facility at Strathclyde park, but this awaited the regional council reorganisation. The ground was owned by the sewage department and was due for development.

He reported that Linwood outdoor facility had closed during the year and the club were actively looking for an alternative site. The Denwood range may be expanded in the near future, but no further information was available.

The mini-games due to be held in Scotland in September had been cancelled as most countries were sending teams to India to a commenwealth shooting event in November. Scotland would be sending a full team and he wished them every success under the captaincy of Angus Dick.

The A squad training had been curtailed due to illness to Harry Milne and his wife, who is now making slow progress from a near-fatal illness. She was wished a speedy recovery.

He reported that Alastair Allan had commenced some work with the B squad.

94/95 Treasurer's Report: John Silcox

94/95 Team Reports

He reported that the accounts had been prepared with the assistance of Shirley MacIntosh and asked for questions on the two sets of accounts presented to the meeting. There was no specific proposals from the floor, but it was suggested the committee was to give consideration to returning to a squad selection system, especially as England now had some measure of pre-selection.

Cliff Ogle mentioned that the NSRA had put forward proposals that would affect the timing and form of future home countries internationals.

Adam Gordon proposed that Anne Hamilton be proposed by the SSRA Council at next years AGM for Life Membership in view of all the hard work she had done for many years. This was seconded by Cyril De Jonckheere and supported by the meeting.

# SSRA Treasurer John R. Silcox

If you have ever asked yourself the question, where could I get some financial help in following my sport? Then read on.

The Scottish Sports Aid Foundation was set up in January 1980 with a remit to provide grant aid to talented young sportsmen and women who have the potential to represent Scotland or the United Kingdom in their chosen discipline. Since its inception the Fund has helped almost two and a half thousand athletes from thirty five different sports. Most of the work goes to the encouragement of the younger age group in the 14-22 year age range.

Grants are awarded by the trust, via the governing bodies of sport and they generally fall into 5 categories:-

#### 1. Encouragement grants

These are awarded to young competitors who are beginning to show potential to be able to go on and compete at National level. Grant level is around £250.

#### 2. Phase II grants

Awarded to young competitors who have reached the level where they are ranked in the top three in their age group in Scotland. Grant level £300 to £400.

#### 3. Phase III grants

Awarded to competitors who are Age Group Champions in Scotland and are competing with distinction at British Age Group level Grant level £450 to £750.

#### 4. Bursaries

Awarded to young competitors who are Age Group Champions in Scotland and are competing with distinction at British Age Group level, competing at Senior Championship level in Scotland, and at European/World level in their age group. Grant level £1000 - £1500.

#### 5. Elite Awards

Awarded to the more established competitors who are, or have, real potential to be Senior Champions in Scotland, and are competing regularly in major championships at European and World Levels. Grant level £2000 - £3000.

Grant levels indicated above are guidelines and as such of course not binding on the Grant Committee.

I should be pleased to hear from any member of the Association who believes that they might qualify for a Scottish Sports Aid Foundation Grant and will do everything to assist in their application.

### History of Kinross & Milnathort Rifle Club

Established in the 1920's in Kinross Drill Hall, in 1932 driven by the efforts of Tom Walker the club moved to the Old Mill in Milnathort and became the Kinross & Milnathort Rifle Club in 1933, 6 firing points at 40 yards. Tom Walker was Scottish Representative for the NSRA from 1933 until 1975, was a fundemental influence in the development of the NSRA Coaching Scheme in 1965, to mention but a few of his great services to Scottish shooting.

During the War the range was requisitioned by the army and only use of Kinross outdoor range sustained the club until new premises were found. In 1957 after some remodelling of the Old Saddlers Workshop in Milnathort the current range was opened, a traditional 4 firing points 25 yard prone range. In 1960 Alister Allan and Bob Norman joined the club. Bob went on to become secretary of the SSRA and develop its status to be accepted by the Sports Council as the governing body in Scotland. Alister becoming one of the truly great international shooters, Olympic medalist and world record holder, over the last 20 years. Alister rejoined the club in 1993 when he return to the area.

In 1993 Kevin Holland joined K&M a qualified GBTSF Coach Educator he has run one Primary Coaching Course so far in Fife using K&M as the venue. The proposed new facility would offer both coaches and shooters a venue to develop their skills in new and existing disciplines.

In 1990's K&M began exploring the possibilty of redeveloping the current site remodelling the range and clubrooms, but this would offer little in the way of new disciplines and was found to be less likely to receive the funding necessary or indeed any funding. It was decided that the club should seek a new site and release the financial asset of the current site. Following the failure to secure an earlier site, a six acre site close to junction 8 of the M90 motorway was available and could accommodate both indoor and outdoor facilities. A range of hotel, B&B accomodation and a Caravan park available in nearby Kinross or Milnathort.

In March 1995 a committee was set up to produce an action plan for the Scottish Target Shooting Federation, (STSF), as governing body responsible to the Scottish Sports Council (SSC) for facilities at this level, for the provision of a Sub-National Multi-Discipline shooting facility to UIT Standard in Central Fife. This arose because of a possible conflict of interests for funding. Robin Shedden of Cluny Clays has declared an interest in developing his clay pigeon business into a full multidisciplined commercial shooting facility.

Representatives from the Scottish Target Shooting Federation, (STSF), Scottish Smallbore Rifle Association (SSRA), Scottish Rifle Association (SRA), Scottish Pistol Association (SPA), the Scottish Clay Target Association (SCTA) and 22. Shooting Clubs in the region, also in attendance David Kemp of the Scottish Sports Council (SSC).

After a number of meetings and presentations by the Secretary David Sheridan Kinross & Milnathort Rifle Club and Robin Shedden Cluny Clays, the Committee decided to put their full backing behind the Kinross & Milnathort Rifle Club proposal. Kinross is ideally situated for accessibility for shooters in Fife, Tayside, Central and Lothian regions.

### Proposal for the new Kinross & Milnathort Rifle Club

After discussions with Individuals, Clubs and Federated Bodies it has been concluded that the new club would provide the following facilities. It would be a multi-discipline centre covering Smallbore Rifle, Smallbore Pistol, Air Weapons and Archery.

- 1) 10 x 50 metre 3P UIT Indoor firing points
- 2) 10 x 25 metre 3P Indoor firing points
- 3) 10 x 10 metre Indoor Air Weapons UIT firing points
- 4) 40 x 50 metre 3P UIT Outdoor covered firing points
- 5) 15 x 100 metre Outdoor covered firing points
- 6) Possibly a 25 metre Outdoor covered Pistol Range
- Capable of hosting a large Air Weapons event by using the width of the 50 metre indoor range.

All ranges will be built for UIT competitions and Matches as appropriate, and be fully accessible to able bodied and disabled shooters. The facility would also cater for:

- 1) Club/function Room.
- 2) Armoury
- 3) Gun Room
- 4) Stats Room
- 5) Kitchen
- 6) Toilets
- 7) Car parking for 40/50 cars

The costings that have been made are based on a standard paper target system in the 50 & 25metre ranges with wire retrieval systems in the 10metre range. It would be essential that all UIT firing points were built to be able to be fitted with 'Gehmann boxes', fan folded single diagram target systems, for trails and international training. However, it is felt that if a target retrieval system were installed in the longer ranges then there would be several benefits:

- Safety: There would be no requirement for shooters to cross the firing line on a regular basis.
- Range management: Each firing point could be independent with shooters coming and going as they complete or start their competition/training.
- 3) UIT finals could be easily staged.

Since the completion of the Denwood Shooting Complex the Aberdeenshire area has seen a steady increase in participant numbers and it is for this reason that the proposed development at Kinross would not only be a boost to target shooting in Fife, but also in Scotland.

Air weapons ranges at grass root level on the Continent over the last forty years have developed a massive youth following and produced some prolific 3 postional air rifle and smallbore shooters who continue to dominate the international circuit.

# THE FIRST COMMONWEALTH SHOOTING CHAMPIONSHIPS NEW DELHI, INDIA 1995 (or "Playing The Waiting Game")

As a new venture this year, The Commonwealth Shooting Federation (CSF) held The First Commonwealth Shooting Championships. These are the same level of competition as the full Commonwealth Games but only for the Shooting Sports. The event was hosted by The National Rifle Association of India at the Dr Karni Singh Ranges, Tuglakabad, near New Delhi. A full complement of UTT disciplines was shot including 300m big bore rifle (These were held at a separate, but close by, venue) which replaced the usual Commonwealth Games full bore events. As usual the STSF did not manage to be a true Federation and the pistol, shotgun and rifle teams all travelled separately. The team was made up as follows.

Travel out. As previously mentioned the different parts of the Scotland delegation travelled separately. The smallbore rifle section travelled out by British Airways (because of the excess baggage deal) on Friday 17th November, leaving Edinburgh Airport at 13:00. Travelling with us was Cliff Ogle who was meeting his Irish colleagues at Heathrow. Angus asked everyone to be at the airport for 11:00 so that we would have plenty time to get all the gear checked in. The first shock of the morning was that Cliff and Tricia were almost the first to arrive.

Angus checked with BA that we could check our luggage right through to Delhi from Edinburgh. They said that as long as we had our Passports that would be no problem. It was a problem for Cliff though as he was to collect his passport from the Irish management when he got to Heathrow upon producing proof that he was taking his malaria tablets!! So all he could do was check in his luggage to Heathrow. This he promptly did and to make up for being early he decided that he had enough time to get back to his flat in Edinburgh and pick up the insect repellent spray he'd forgotten. And so he departed against Tricia's advice. Soon the whole team were assembled and we duly checked in our luggage hoping to see it all again in Delhi. The flight to Heathrow was uneventful and we disembarked and left Cliff to collect his luggage. He had to get his luggage to Terminal 4 himself whereas ours was taken there by BA!

In the departure lounge in Terminal 4 we met up with the entire Northern Irish and English teams who were travelling on the same flight as us. This caused some confusion while boarding the Delhi flight as we heard one stewardess asking another why we all had different coloured tracksuits!! Further drama as we wait to take off and Robin is called forward to the door of the plane and asked to identify his gun case (more on that later). Some managed to sleep on the plane while others watched the in flight movie "Apollo 13", an amazingly appropriate film for an aircraft. By the way if anyone can tell us what happened to all the main characters we would be glad to know since the Pilot interrupted the film soundtrack at the appropriate moment to tell us where we were!!

Saturday 18/11/95 and so at 0700 local time, we arrived in The Indira Ghandi International Airport, New Delhi where we were immediately sent to the wrong parking slot and had to wait on the plane while this was all sorted out. Eventually we got through to Passport control where we were greeted by representatives of the National Rifle Association of India(NRAI). The four teams (we were also accompanied by Malta on the flight) were left to their own devices to get through passport control and customs while John Hunter and his wife were led off through the VIP lounge and given a car and driver for the duration. And I thought it was the competitors that were supposed to be important.

All luggage arrived in Delhi and so we headed of to customs. It took three hours to get all the teams weapons through the Delhi Police checkpoint. This was also delayed because they were not expecting Scotland to have anyone on the flight and so did not have our Indian Firearms passes ready. This must be a result of the team travelling in bits and pieces. All future events must be organised better in this respect. It was at this point that Robin opened his gun case (the one he had been asked to identify at Heathrow) to find that his Centre 10 stock was in two pieces instead of the usual one !! Some delay was further added while Robin and Angus and an NRAI representative tried to find a BA desk to lodge a claim.

That done we were all embarked on to some ramshackle buses and driven off to the range. We were surprised when as the bus left the airport we were joined on the bus by four uniformed men carrying sub machine guns! This combined with the general poverty and squalor evident on the journey prompted all of the tearn at one point to think "What am I doing here?" David summed up the state of the place by saying its like the "Bring out your dead" scene from "Monty Python and The Holy Grail".

With all the weapons deposited at the range we were driven to the Hotel. On arrival we were greeted with garlands and given appropriate "Caste Marks". I must say that we were not impressed by the Hotel when we first arrived but after speaking to the other teams we found that we had the better deal. They were not staying in the Hotel but in a series of buts on the other side of the "campus". The whole hotel complex and the road to the range was swarming with Delhi police. Dinner that evening (as on every other evening) was served outside by the pool.

Sunday 19/11/95 Every one in the smallbore team was rudely awakened at about 0400 on Sunday with people knocking on room doors or in some cases coming into the rooms. At breakfast we discovered that it had been Hotel staff unsure of what rooms had been allocated the previous day trying to find empty rooms for the pistol boys who had just arrived from Amsterdam. This was opening ceremony day and the overall team manager decided to have a team get together before hand to meet everyone and tell us what was happening.

Security was tight for the opening ceremony as it was being attended by the Indian President and as we are all aware they seem to have some difficulty in keeping the holder of that post alive. As part of the security measures we were told that no cameras would be allowed into the ceremony. This decision seemed to be reversed at the last minute and some cameras were allowed in. Much to our annoyance this was only announced once we were at the range and had left all our cameras at the Hotel.

We also had the problem that we were sent to the wrong starting place. All the teams were supposed to meet up in the 50 metre range, but we were sent straight to the back of the arena. We ended up going through the same security check three times before we met up with the rest of the teams. It was at this point that we met up with our Indian representative for the event. She was a young shooter called Shweeta who was tasked with looking after both the Scottish and English teams. The opening ceremony was fairly unimpressive in fact the only incident I can remember from it was Martin tripping over one of the flags that marked the arena because he was too busy smiling at the President!! We got our first view of New Delhi from the back of the arena. It was a cloudless blue sky except for over New Delhi where there was a huge black smog cloud. That cloud was there all week!! Dinner was supplemented by cocktails sponsored by an Indian Whisky company.

Monday 20/11/95 Training day. This was the chance for all of the smallbore team to get familiar with the target system on the 50m range. This was a Spieth system similar to ones used on full bore ranges in this country. The target end had two boards for each target mounted in a scoring pit. Only one board for each target was in view at a time and when it was slid down into the pit the other board came up in its place. They were mounted on the back wall of the pit one behind the other so that you were in fact shooting a two slightly different distances, but not enough to make a difference. The targets were changed manually by people working in the pit. Each shooter had a box with four buttons on for communicating with their target changer. The buttons were marked 'Sighter', 'Change Target', 'Record' and 'Off'. The way it worked was that this box would light one of three lights in the pit, depending on which button was pushed, and also sound a buzzer. The target changer would then change the target according to the main emphasis from the Indian range officers on this day was on what they called your 'Shooting Zone'. These were basically lines drawn on the firing point to try and ensure that shooters did not interfere with each other. We were told that they would deal severely with anyone who transgressed this rule.

The range turned out to be rather windless on this day. It was baffled so that no sky was visible and also had netting almost all the way down every eight firing points (there were about 50-60 in all). Everyone in the team got a shoot except for Robin whose gun was handed over to an Indian gunsmith for a temporary repair. Meanwhile great interest was being shown in Lynda's gun. She has a standard Anschutz barrel and action mounted in a stock made by Robert Nibbs. The action is bedded in aluminium and this greatly interested the Indians and particularly the New Zealanders. In fact quite a bit of time during the week was spent showing the Indians any esoteric pieces of kit we had, though most interest went in Lynda's stock and Ronnie's Nibbs' butt plate.

As usual, dinner was outside and quote of the evening (and probably the week!) came from Angus as we headed down. He asked Lynda, and i quote, "Lynda, will you rub your hands all over me?" Perhaps I should explain the situation. Angus had forgotten to put any insect repellent on before going outside and when Lynda said that she hadn't forgotten and had even put some on her hands, Angus came out with the question. At this point I would like to point out the problems we had with currency. As you may know the Indian currency is the Rupee. It is in fact illegal to pay for anything in India in anything other than Rupees. The NRAI would only take US Dollars or Sterling. This was the first of many things to annoy Angus.

**Tuesday 21/11/95** The first competition day. The ladies prone event was today's smallbore shoot. Amazingly enough the shoot started on time. Lynda had a good steady shoot estimated by Martin as 586. Tricia was also quite steady until her fifth string when the wheels came off. A string of a seven followed by two eights sank her chances. When the scores were finally posted (the time taken to score them indicated that they were not being scored in the pit but back in the admin. building) we found that Lynda's 586 had become a 582 and she was fourth. The other scores were two 585s and a 583 so Angus was straight in with a challenge. Unfortunately the challenge failed so since there is no final in this event Lynda was left fourth only one point off the bronze. A creditable effort for her first major championship.

After the womens shoot was over it was announced that a practice session would start at 1:30. This was later cancelled for no apparent reason. Robin's gun was still away getting fixed so having practised air rifle in the morning he, David and Gordon headed into Delhi to do some shopping/sightseeing.

Wednesday 22/11/95 Today was air rifle day. The men's event was held in the morning and the ladies in the afternoon with both finals after the ladies 40 shots. The results took so long that the finals were delayed until after the daily medal ceremony. The men's results were surprisingly low. The leader was on 577 and David and Robin were tied for 3rd/4th on 574. In the ladies event it was Lynda's turn for a disaster and Tricia managed to get into the final in 7th place.

The 60/40 shot courses were shot on paper targets but the finals were to be shot on Spieth electronic targets. This turned out to be a complete disaster for our shooters. David's pre final statement that he preferred the hard evidence of a paper target was given extra weight when one of his shots was registered as a 0 (yes that's a zero). He instantly complained and he was given an extra shot at the end. This also failed to register and so he was given another one. This did register but was too late to repair the damage already done. One of his earlier shots had been registered as a seven and due to the erratic behaviour of his target this must now be in doubt. This was acknowledged by the jury and he was eventually offered a reshoot but he was so disgusted he refused. We tried to argue for a complete reshoot on paper but nothing came of it.

Some consolation was gained in that David and Robins 574s were enough to secure them the Gold medal in the pairs event. Some relief was also evident that the team had managed to get its first medal though it was felt that David had been robbed of an individual medal.

Several theories were put forward for the misbehaviour of these delicate electronic instruments but the most plausible was the way they were powered. Delicate instruments are very fussy about the mains power they get. The Indian mains is not best known for its consistency. As a result the equipment should have been protected by mains filters to remove any spikes or dropouts. No such filters were used. In fact they didn't even use a plug!! The wires were just pushed into the socket and held by small pieces of wood!!!!!

Tricia was selected for a drugs test so Angus stayed at the range and asked Ronnie if he would make sure that David got the taxi and Indian escort to the airport which had been arranged for him. When we got back to the hotel the travel desk denied all knowledge of any taxi and said they could arrange one for 300 Rupees. Unsure of what had been arranged Ronnie waited until Angus carne back. Angus went to the desk and asked again. They still denied all knowledge and the price had now gone up to 500 Rupees! As it was getting late Angus got David a taxi and sent him off. I don't think I've ever seen anyone so happy to be leaving! Angus was now getting a little more annoyed.

Thursday 23/11/95 Attention switches back to the 50m range for the men's prone event. This was easily the biggest field in all the smallbore events. Martin and Gordon turned up at the range not even knowing their firing points as Tony Lithgow had collected all the draws but not handed on the smallbore draws to Angus. He allegedly explained this by saying he was only interested in the shotgun events!

This was sorted out by getting a look at Don Baker's (Northern Ireland) list. Martin shot well and was confident of a good score. Lynda's estimate was anywhere between 585 and 590. Gordon however was today's disaster. His estimated score of 577 was summed up by Robin as "Not even a good air rifle score!" Marking today took even longer but by now we were getting used to waiting around. In fact they took so long that it was dark by the time they came out and the final had to be delayed until the next day. Gordon's estimate turned out to be correct and Martin ended up with a 590 and seventh place in the final just ahead of Cliff Ogle.

The journey back to the hotel was by bus as usual but tonight the Indian driver decided to wander off after everyone had boarded his bus. After a few minutes wait and general barracking one of the Australian shooters decided to drive the bus to the hotel himself. This got a very quick response out of the security guards (who would not let him out of the range) and the driver who came running after his bus!!

This evening's entertainment was a trip to the house of the Indian Minister for Sport. This involved a one hour fifty minute journey across smog bound Delhi for about fifty minutes of more curry, dodgey drinks and excellent coffee. The trip back to the hotel only took about fifty minutes so I suspect our bus driver was lost on the way over. The journey probably seemed longer for Gordon. Ask him about a Welsh shotgun shooter!

Another of the Indians who were helping us was a man called Dua. It was with Dua that Angus had arranged David's taxi for the previous night. When he heard that nothing had been done Dua was most upset and threatened to quit straight away.

Friday 24/11/95 This was supposed to be a free day and we had planned to either go sightseeing in Delhi or possibly even to Agra to see the Taj Mahal. This was all scrapped of course because the men's prone final was now being held this morning and Robin had still not been presented with his pairs medal for the air rifle

In the prone final Martin had a bad start but recovered to maintain his seventh place. This event was dominated by the Isle of Man since Stuart Waterston won the individual Gold and with partner Harry Creevy won the pairs Gold as well. This was Martin's first international never mind his first major championship and seventh place was an excellent result.

Also held today were the men's and ladies air pistol events. The same format was used as for the air rifle events only this time the Spieth target changers had gone and paper targets were used in the final. This was as a result of all the complaints they had received after the rifle finals. Not just from the Scottish team but from all the others as well. Scottish interest was retained by Alistair MacDonald who was placed third going into the final.

Unfortunately he was not able to keep up the good work and slipped to seventh, but he was the only non rifle shooter to make a final. The other major event of the day was that Robin finally got his gun back in one piece and was able to try it out. It seemed to shoot okay. He was also presented with his Gold medal. David's absence was explained as an illness not that he'd gone home. Also missing was Andy Lawrence from Wales who had won the pairs bronze. He really was ill and was reputedly bringing up blood. His weight loss over the 12 days was allegedly one and three-quarter stone!!

Saturday 25/11/95 The ladies standard rifle was today's event. Tricia looked as though she was on to a goo score with 198 prone and a good standing string but her kneeling left something to be desired. Lynda had a threestanding but recovered. The final was again delayed due to the time taken to score the targets. When the result was finally published Tricia was eighth a point ahead of Sue Hartop from Wales. Everybody got ready including Tricia. She had all her gear on the firing point when it was announced that the Welsh had challenged Sue's score and the challenge had been upheld (the only one all week!). That meant that Tricia was out of the final on count back. She was naturally upset and we all felt for her. This result meant that this was the only smallbore rifle final without Scottish representation.

It also turned out to be the most tense final with a sudden death tie shoot for the Bronze medal between Julie Malcolm of Wales and an Indian shooter. Julie won it with an 8.5 versus a 5.7.

This was also the day that India started to wreak its revenge on the Scottish smallbore team. Up till now every one had been surviving quite well. Today Angus carne down with a tummy bug that was to keep him at the Hotel most of the next day, both Gordon and Ronnie now had cold symptoms and Robin wasn't eating very much.

Sunday 26/11/95 The final event of the meeting and Ronnie finally gets to shoot something. Due to Angus's illness Robin and Ronnie head to the range on their own only to find that Ronnie has stupidly left his ammo box key back at the hotel. Just before the match starts Lynda and Martin appear and Lynda and Shweeta go back to the hotel for the key. Ronnie meanwhile shoots the prone with some of Robin's ammo. Both have a good prone shoot but Ronnie starts to feel it during the standing. He felt it was the hottest day of the meeting but is not sure whether his cold was influencing that. Both held it together for the standing which was more than one Sri Lankan and a New Zealander managed. The Sri Lankan feinted on the firing point and was rushed to hospital. He later returned quite well. The New Zealander was unable to get all his shots off in time and so retired. The kneeling proved to be Ronnie's and especially Robin's downfall. Both ran out of steam and had disappointing scores.

Again there was a long delay in results being posted. This time the excuse was that the computer had broken. Eventually they were posted (hand written) at 3.45 and the final was started at 4.15. It was not possible to delay the final to the next day since that was the closing ceremony and there were no medal ceremonies that day. Both Robin (5th) and Ronnie (8th) made the final but neither excelled themselves in it. The pairs result gave some cheer though as they had managed to hold it together enough to get the Bronze medal. In fact they were only four points behind the Malaysians in second place which made them even more sick about their kneeling effort. The final finished in almost darkness and the shooters were hurried of to the medal ceremony before they could get packed up. It seems the Indians couldn't keep their medal presenters waiting but they could keep everyone else waiting.

The shotgunners were due to fly out tonight. They had arranged to leave the hotel at 8:30 but Tony Lithgow was still seen in the lobby at 9:15. More waiting !

Monday 27/11/95 The closing ceremony was not due to start until late afternoon so it was decided that the entire smallbore team would head into Delhi and do some shopping. We met Shweeta outside the Wimpey restaurant and she showed us some places to buy things. Transport was provided by two taxis at 400 Rupces each for 8 hours. That's only eight pounds each l'The closing ceremony was more memorable than the opening one. After the speeches though things livened up and we were treated to a pipe and military band display, some gymnastics, traditional dancing and some children telling us how to use traffic lights (?!?!). The finale was an excellent fireworks display although we did wonder if one of the larger ones which went off quite near the ground was deliberate or not. Back at the hotel team managers were presented with mementoes and a certain Indian pistol shooter called Jaspal Rana was presented with a trophy just for being himself I think. In general he was treated as being nothing less than a god all week (he did win eight Gold medals mind you) and it struck me that he probably thought he was a god.

Conclusions At first the haul of only two medals seemed to be rather disappointing but closer inspection showed that we didn't do too badly. It was only cruel luck which robbed David and possibly Robin of a medal in the air rifle individual. Who knows what would have happened if it had been shot on paper? Lynda was also unlucky not to pick up a medal in the ladies prone. We also managed to get at least one finalist in every event except the ladies 3P where again Tricia was unlucky not to make it.

For some of the team this was their first major championship and their results were encouraging. This however does not mean we can sit back and relax now. There's work to be done if we want to expand our medal haul at the next championship in Malaysia in 1997. Hopefully the team for this event will be the team for the 1998 Commonwealth Garnes as they will be held on the same ranges.

One opportunity we missed for medals was in the 300m events. These were held instead of the usual full bore events. These are open (ie both men and women shoot together) and consist of a free rifle prone event (60 shots) a free rifle 3P event (3x40) and a standard rifle 3P event (3x40). The winning scores were appallingly bad in both 3P events (1080 in the 3x40) that any one of half a dozen Scottish 3P shooters would at least have got a medal if not won the event! This must be rectified if these events are held again in Malaysia. Though the low turnout in some of the events must leave this in doubt.

I'm sure the team would like me at this point to thank Angus for all the work he did both before and during the event. The organisation as far as the smallbore team was concerned was excellent though there seemed to be a lack of communication at times from the overall team management.
