View from the Hot Seat

Welcome to the last issue of TENpointNINE of this millenium. Quite a thought really.

It must be more than quarter of a century since this Association was formed. It started off quite small with limited responsibility, simply the not unimportant task of selecting Commonwealth Games teams. Membership grew to a peak of over 400 and shooting as a Commonwealth Games sport has produced more medals for Scotland than any other. Quite a formidable record to live up to.

While membership has declined over the last 10 years or so, our activities continue to grow. We are now viewed by sportscotland as a fully fledged National Governing Body of sport and as mentioned in previous issues of TENpointNINE, this brings with it certain additional responsibilities. These responsibilities cost money and the only way for SSRA to raise independent finance is from the membership. It is therefore essential that we reverse the trend of recent years and actively increase membership numbers.

In addition there needs to be more and better communication between clubs, counties and SSRA to halt the decline in shooting participation, to fight the closure of our ranges, to resist efforts by local authorities to remove rates relief and to create a stronger infrastructure which will see this sport continue well into the next century.

This will not happen overnight and some clubs may well lose their fights. If this happens we need to regroup, not to simply give up and disband the clubs but to get together and make what is left stronger.

We need to encourage youth into our sport. Yes, this has been made more difficult after the tragedy at Dunblane. Some parents may well be sensitive to the idea of their children taking up shooting as a sport. But if this is done sensibly and responsibly, possibly in co-operation with another youth organisation then there is no reason why another generation of competitive shooters should not enjoy our sport. Indeed from speaking to people totally outside the sport, the common sense view seems to be that target shooting disciplines were not to blame for Dunblane and should not be victimised because of it.

We must build on this and look forward, start promoting our sport again and not be ashamed of it. This is more than just advertising, it is about education, letting people know what our sport is about and letting those in authority get to know us as normal human beings. As athletes we need to get involved in the wider sporting community, particularly at local level. A mine of information can be obtained from local sports councils and the time commitment may not be particularly onerous.

As a national governing body of sport, SSRA has a responsibility to look after the grass roots development of the sport, but it cannot do it alone. It needs enthusiasm from the clubs and a will to succeed from its members. As I said in the first issue of this new style newsletter, if we want to have a sport in the next millenium, we have to stop the rot now. The future is in your hands, please don't squash it!

inclosed with this issue is a nembership application and competition entry form.

The membership application / renewal form asks for some additional information this year. Previously only those claiming junior or veteran ages were required to give their date of birth, this year all members are asked to supply this. It would be helpful for Council to have some idea of the age groups we represent and we are often asked to give this information to sportscotland. Anyone shy about their birthday can just put in an age!

The form also asks for e-mail address if you are happy for this to be used by the Association. More and more of our correspondence is being dealt with by e-mail and we are also developing a web site which we hope to launch early next year. Demand for this could be better assessed if we knew how many members use e-mail.

Some guidance is given on eligibility for membership as there has been some confusion in recent years.

The final addition to the form is an occupation box. It would be helpful to know what skills are available within the membership which could be of use to Shooting as a whole. Obviously if you don't want to fill in this box, please leave it blank.

The entry form has all competitions on it although your attention is drawn to the different closing dates for entries. Obviously the earlier you get your entries in for the individual competitions, the longer you have to shoot the cards!

Scottish Meeting 1999 Logie Steading, Forres

This year the NSRA Scottish Meeting returned to Logie Steading near Forres under the watchful eye of Duncan Garrow, the local organiser of Dallas Rifle Club.

The meeting attracted 350 competitors from all over the UK, although it has to be said that there were far more travelled up from the south of England than came from the local area. This is a fall in the entry from last year and continues a steady decline in the numbers attending the meeting over recent years. This decline will have to be reversed if we are to continue to have the benefit of our own National Meeting. The weather is always a good topic of conversation for these meetings and Forres provided a good variety of conditions to talk about including pouring rain and bright sunshine!

The main event of the week, at least for the Scots present, was the Earl Haig trophy for the Scottish Long Range Championship. For those who have not experienced a Scottish Meeting, this event is confined to NSRA eligible Scots and is shot in two stages. The first stage is shot in squads on the first Sunday of the meeting over a dewar course of fire with proportionate numbers from each squad going through to make 20 in the

second stage. The second stage is shot on Friday afternoon after the Home Countries International Match over a Scottish Match (3 20 shot cards at 100 yards). Competition is usually fierce and this year was no exception. Only 8 points separated the top 10 competitors with Cyril De Jonckheere from Dumfries coming out on top with 580, 20 vears after he first won the competition. What are the chances of him successfully defending it for a second time?! Only one point behind was Sinclair Bruce of Alloa. Callander's Gordon Motion (Loco to his friends!) finished third on 576 with Bill Brown (Chobham) beating Hugh Simpson (Wick Old Stagers) on countback on 574. Lance Graham (E U Alumni), Bill Vaughan (Selkirk) and Simon Clark (Bon Accord) tied on 573 with Tom Hodgson (Dumfries) and James Brown (Perth) making up the ten on

Bill Vaughan won the B, C & D competitors section and Simon Clark wont he Adam Gordon Quaich for the best Junior (U21).

In the aggregate competitions there was some representation by members in the prizes but in the Grand Aggregate, the visitors seemed to have the best of it. Only Cliff Ogle (E U

Alumni) managed to get amongst them in X Class with second, Simon Clark was third in A, Peter Dingle was third and Bill Vaughan 5th in B Class, Susan Mackay (Watten) was fifth in C Class and David Simpson (Wick Old Stagers) and Jamie Cole-Hamilton (Bon Accord) finished third and fourth respectively in D Class. All of these competitors (with the exception of Cliff) have earned promotion to the next class up.

Barbara Mackay was the leading Scot in the Ladies events but didn't manage to walk away with the silverware this time. The Junior (U18) competition was won by Stuart Ruthven (Queen Victoria School) with Scots taking all bar one of the remaining 6 prize spoons. The U15 competition was won by Georgie

GB Squads 2000

The NSRA have recently announced the British squads for 2000. Eight Scots have made the squads and this may be increased when the Junior squads are announced shortly.

In the Men's Air rifle, both Robin Law and David Rattray have qualified in second and third places respectively.

In Men's Prone, Bill Brown re-enters the squad after a break of a few years, Martin Sinclair has diversified from 3P and both will join Jonathan Hammond who maintains his place from last year.

Martin finished second in the selection table for 3P with some very consistent shooting over the summer.

In Ladies Prone, Susan Bell stays in from last year. Janis Thomson and Lynda Sinclair have both qualified to join her.

Janis' personal best in the Hampshire 3P match at the start of the season helped her to qualify as one of only 3 in the Ladies 3P squad. (When are more women going to take up this discipline - Ed!!!)

Congratulations to all of the above on their qualification.

Next year is Olympic year and Britain has one quota place for Men's prone as well as 4 for Clay target shooting.

As there are no further quota places available at the World Cups next year, there may not be many major matches on offer to the non Olympic squad members. However, our shooters may be offered other minor matches abroad which will offer them good experience against a higher calibre of competition.

Freuchie 1999

The Freuchie for uninitiated is the Wilkinson Sword trophy for the Scottish Championship. Matchplay Shot during the lunchtimes of the Scottish meeting, the competition starts with 81 competitors competing in groups of three knockouts with a stage shot on each of and Tuesday Monday with the lunchtimes semi-final on Thursday lunchtime. The final is shot on Thursday afternoon. All matches are shot over 1 card at 100 yards.

Historically the event was restricted to Scots and it used to be a fight to get one of the 81 start places available. However, over the years, interest has dwindled and the competition has been opened to non Scots, although only members can win the trophy. Even so, there were a large number of byes in the first round with only 53 competitors entering.

Of the three finalists only Jim Cole-Hamilton was eligible for the Wilkinson Sword and so it was really a battle for the whisky. English shooter Tony Lincoln from Bedford came out on top, with Jim and P Gumn tied on 9.

A separate final for the best C & D class scores is also held for the Sgian Dubh trophy. Once again the winner A Cerrino was not eligible for the trophy but walked off with a bottle of whisky. The Sgian Dubh went to Mary Melvin with David Simpson finishing third.

The Team competitions were sponsored by Lapua this year with ammunition prizes being awarded to winning teams. This could best be described as a Bon Accord benefit event as they won all but one of the team competitions. Bedford managed to secure the Forteviot but Bon made up for it by taking first and second in the Pullar Targe. It was good to see two of our best juniors, Simon Clark and Neil Stirton, taking up key places in the Bon Accord first teams and we look forward to seeing them go far. They also helped Aberdeenshire to win the County Sextette.

The Home Countries International results for the main and ladies teams were disappointing. Sinclair Bruce had the best score on the range (394) but the top end of

Scottish ISSF Championships

The Scottish Small-bore Rifle Association have held Air Rifle and 3-Positions Championships, run under ISSF rules, for a

number of years now. Following on from the introduction by the



NSRA of a British "Championship" under ISSF rules for all small-bore rifle events, the SSRA decided this year to expand the 3P Championships into a full small-bore ISSF Championship, with the addition of prone events for Men and Women. The events were held at the Denwood Target Shooting Centre in Aberdeen, using the few target changers currently operational in Scotland.

The Men's 3-Positions event was the first to be fired, and the new UK No. 2, Martin Sinclair produced an excellent 399 prone (shame about the 38th shot), with defending champion Donald McIntosh close behind with 395. Martin really forged ahead during the standing however, with two strings of 97 in the middle of his 370. Steady kneeling produced new PB of 1152 - the best score shot in the UK this year. This gave him a 23 point lead over Donald McIntosh (1129), with Robin Law - firing his first 3P match since the 1998 Commonwealth Games - back in third with 1122. The final produced a tussle for second and third, and with Donald starting badly, but retaining second place after Robin fell away over the last three shots.

The Women's Prone match was also shot on the Saturday, and saw Susan Bell starting to recover from a poor season to date, her 590 just pipping club-mate Lynda Sinclair by a point. Championship organiser Shirley McIntosh came out of stats long enough to

hold off the challenge of Barbara Mackay for third place.

Sunday proved to be much colder, and in the

morning substantially windier. The Women's 3P match was a

fight for the medals, as there were only three entries. Janis Thomson came out on top, thanks to more consistent standing than her opposition, and hung onto that lead during the final, despite Shirley's good score of 95.8 (far better than any of the men, and without any training for nearly a year).

The Men's Prone contained an elimination round, with two Aberdeenshire juniors to the fore in the first squad, Simon Clark top of the heap with 589, despite the range netting blowing across his target for much of the detail, followed by Jonathan Hammond on 585. The second squad upped the ante a little, with 590s from both Martin Sinclair and Cliff Ogle. Simon continued his good run into the main match, top score with 592 a point ahead of Donald McIntosh, with Bon Accord veteran Jack Lavety a further three points behind. Donald produced an excellent final of 105.1, including a 10.9 and two 10.8s, leaping ahead of Simon to secure the Championship, and in doing so securing a hat trick of Scottish Championships, having won the Air Rifle in 1996 and the 3P in 1998.

From 2000 onwards the event will be run as an open, with competitors from throughout the UK welcome to sample the delights of Aberdeen in the summer. The event has also been granted authorised meeting status by NSRA for the purposes of GB squad selection and scores.

The Scottish was held at Lauder in the grounds of Thirlstane Castle and the Haig was one by Bill Gibbon. Our main team soundly defeated the English in the Home Countries international although the ladies narrowly lost. At that time there was no Junior international. The Freuchie was won by Shirley Smith (now McIntosh) (was it really that long ago! - Ed)

At Bisley both the main and ladies teams lost the Home Countries internationals. This was also the year where the NSRA took the hint and included a 3P match which unfortunately we lost. It became a part of the official programme two years later with full international status.

The SSRA Grand Prix series finished in a tie (what a coincidence) between Gordon Winch and Hugh Simpson Jnr.

Manor Powis near Stirling was being investigated as a potential site for a national facility.

The 3P Championship was won by Robin Law and the Speedway by Cliff Ogle. We won the New Zealand match.

International teams were sent to the Gilbey's Ulster Games in Northern Ireland and to Bassingborne in Cambridgeshire to take on the Army. The Minigames were held in Wales and the team consisted of Bill Murray, Gordon Winch, John Knowles, Bill Hamilton, Robin Law, Donald McIntosh and Shirley Smith.


Sydney, Australia which is being held over the 10 days immediately prior to the start of the Commonwealth Championships.

The trip is a fairly intensive 3 weeks of shooting, particularly for those doing more than one discipline. Each competition will consist of two matches. In Australia this will be a team of 3 match and an individual match while in New Zealand it will be a pairs match

and an individual match. However in New Zealand, provision is made for a third team member to shoot during the pairs match for a separate "badge" event. Training will be available on the days when the athletes are not competing



and in the majority of cases, the athletes will be on the range virtually every day. When they are not competing or training they will

be there to support their teammates (both morally and with carrying heavy kit bags!) so there won't be much time for sightseeing.

These matches will be against some of the best competitors in the world and as well as being important competitions in their own right, they are important training for the Commonwealth

Games in 3 years time. Our athletes will be able to experience the atmosphere of a Commonwealth Match, including

international judging and will be competing against many of the athletes who will be at the Games proper. For a few it will be their first trip to an event of this level but there are quite a few old hands in the team with two of the team being veterans of 3 Commonwealth

Games and going for a fourth.

Funding for the trip is coming from a number of sources. Those athletes who receive Lottery awards are fully funded by the Lottery unit. The remainder are being funded by a mixture of sportscotland High Performance funding and personal contribution. Sponsorship is being sought to try and reduce this

personal contribution but the response to date has been poor. The Scottish Target Shooting

Federation has also organised a raffle with the first prize of dinner, bed and breakfast at the Dunkeld House Hotel and a days shotgun tuition with Ian Marsden. Most clubs will have received books of raffle tickets to sell and it is hoped that the rest of the shooting fraternity in Scotland will get behind this team and help in the fundraising effort.

The Council of this Association would like to take this opportunity to wish the team the best of success. They have all worked

hard to gain selection, let's hope they can also bring back some medals.

Blind Shooting

In the early part of 1998 Jonathan Hammond had discussions with the Grampian Society for the Blind with a view to introducing them to "Blind Shoooting".

In July 1998, following further discussion with the Society, Ken Nash of the NSRA came to the Denwood Range in Aberdeen and gave demonstration of equipment that was used for "Blind Shooting". This consists of an air rifle fitted with special telescopic sights that detect light intensity and convert that to sound. The distance covered was 10m.

Ten members of the Society turned up on the day to have a go, and they greatly enjoyed the day. It was clear from the success of the day that the venture was well worth pursuing. The event was also well publicised as Jonathan had called at Grampian Television's studios earlier in the week to tell them about the project. They said they were very interested and they duly appeared on the day to film the event and interview participants and the result was televised that day in a news report.

Following the event Jonathan decided to try and raise the cash for the equipment for one lane. He approached Ian Shanks, a well known member of the Bon Accord Rifle Club, who worked for British Telecom. He wrote a persuasive letter highlighting the need for the equipment to BT, which Ian very kindly guided to the right person.

As a result funds were provided for the purchase of the equipment.

It has taken some time to get everything organised by at last shooting for the Blind is taking off at the Bon Accord



Rifle Club. Six visually mpaired shooters have entered a national individual league for visually impaired shooters and several others want to have a go. A regular evening has been organised, with members of Bon Accord helping the Blind shooters. It is hoped that the venture will be a great success and that it will encourage Clubs in other parts of Scotland to set up similar facilities.

This is the sort of venture which will undoubtedly enhance the image of target shooting.

1999 Prone Grand Prix Series

The final three prone grand prix of the season lived up to expectations producing an exciting end to the series.

The first stage of the Grand Prix was shot on an unsquadded basis as part of the Caithness competitions. Some consternation was caused by Association Secretary Shirley McIntosh in her first outdoor shoot for many months. Shooting in B Class after a poor result in the only Grand Prix shot during the 1998 season, her last card in one of the worst details of the day was 199 to finish with 590. This left her 10 points ahead of the next best in B Class and the meeting organisers and Association officials unilaterally decided to reclassify her into A Class. Unfortunately for Sinclair Bruce his score of 586 was not enough to maintain his lead. Local expert Hugh Simpson finished third with 584.

This left Barbara Mackay as winner of B Class with a score of 580 just one point ahead of local shooters John Campbell and John Sinclair. Both were tied on their last cards, so the tie was broken on the second last card, John Campbell's 195 beating John Sinclair's 192.

More ties in C Class were resolved on countback. Robert Campbell's 193 finish for a score of 573 was better than range officer Jim Swanson's 191 and so he took the gold medal. Mary Melvin's 562 gave her third place. D Class was the battle of the Simpson boys with younger brother David's steady 574 (which would have won C Class) taking gold ahead of Hugh's 563. Henry Ross and Jamie Cole-Hamilton tied for third place on 563.

Needless to say, after applying the handicap to these scores, Hugh and David walked away with the Pairs.

In the Grand Prix qualifier, Sinclair Bruce took his revenge with a 588, two points ahead of Jim Cole-Hamilton who in turn was a further two points ahead of John Sinclair. John Campbell and Donald McIntosh came next on 583 with Shirley McIntosh on 582 in

sixth place, proving that unless you practice shooting 9 cards in a day, you can't expect to maintain your form from start to finish. Barbara Mackay on 581 and Graeme Sutherland on 580 meant that the 10 shot final was going to be a close run thing.

Jim started off well and had quickly demolished Sinclair's lead, but Sinclair held on and after the 10 shots the two were tied. A sudden death tie shot decided the winner and Jim's 10.4 secured victory ahead of Sinclair's Further down the order Donald, Barbara and Graeme were all shooting well. Donald put himself ahead of John C after the first shot and took John S's lead after the second with a 10.9. He continued to shoot steadily and retained third place. Meanwhile Barbara and Graeme were having a battle to themselves, with Graeme quickly clawing back Barbara's lead. However, Barbara finished strongly to stay in fourth place with Graeme in fifth. John C, John S and Shirley propped up the order.

In the C & D final, David Simpson continued his good form to win with a 386 finishing with a 99. Sheena Sharp shot steadily for 381 and second place with Robert Campbell a point behind in third.

The Grampian Grand Prix on 29 August was well attended for a change. This was largely due to the fact that the unveiling of the memorial to Adam Gordon was scheduled for

that day. It is a shame that it takes an event such as that to get some people to turn up for a competition, however, it was gratifying to Adam's memory.

Cliff Ogle led the way in A class in the qualifying competition with a fine 595 showing what a difference a jacket can make. After struggling for many months with a new jacket (which incidentally was the same make as the old one), he decided to try the old one again to see if it made any difference. The result would seem to be the proof that it did. Jim Cole-Hamilton finished second with 592 and Gordon Winch in third proved that his gun hasn't rusted away completely with a 591 beating Cyril De Jonckheere and Robin Law on countback.

B Class was won by Barbara Mackay continuing her consistent season with a 590 from Tony Credland's 586 and Trevor Hastings on 584. C Class was closely fought with Gold being decided on countback also. W Jones from the Isle of Man scored 574 but his 97 last string was better than Erling Watt's 95. Third place went to Sheena Sharp on 572. In Class D, Lawrence Cooper's 571 was far ahead of the pace with Jamie Cole-Hamilton coming second on 563 and George MacGregor third on 556.

The Junior event was won by Simon Clark and the Ladies by Barbara Mackay. This event and Caithness are the only two meetings on the GP circuit which have ladies competitions and this year Barbara has won them both.

In the pairs, an A Class pairing of Cliff Ogle

and Donald McIntosh tied with the Cole-Hamiltons with Robin Law and Sinclair Bruce taking third.

The Grand Prix qualifier was one of the highest standard shoots we have seen all year in Scotland with a score of 589 being counted out of the 10 shot final. Cliff Ogle and Gordon Winch led the way with 595, Cliff taking the number 1 slot on countback. Next came a battle between our two best ladies, Susan Bell and Barbara Mackay on 592 with Hugh Simpson (591), Robin Law, Donald McIntosh (both 590) and Jim Ward (589) making up the eight finalists.

At the same time as the Grand Prix qualifier was taking place, the top 10 in C and D class shot in their own final. Patrick Jess finished on 384 with Sheena Sharp a point behind. Jamie Cole-Hamilton finished strongly for 381 and third place.

The final itself was very exciting with places changing after almost every shot. Thanks to Neil Stirton's laptop computer, spectators were able to watch the scores changing. After a fine string of good 10s Gordon pulled ahead of Cliff by just 0.3 to take the 9 points for first place. Barbara shot the second best final of the day of 102.8 to take third place. Donald's 103.6 pulled him up to fourth place while Susan dropped to fifth. Hugh picked up the final point with Robin and Jim finishing seventh and eighth respectively. In fairness Jim's score of 99.4 was marred by a 7.6 caused by the fright he got at finding a rather large spider crawling down his shooting hat!

This left the points table very tight at the top

In the qualifying stage, Cliff Ogle again demonstrated the worth of his old jacket with a 591 to win A class with Jim Cole-Hamilton second on 590 and clubmate Neil Stirton third with 589 and first place in the junior event.

In B class Gordon Motion finished first on 585 ahead of Barbara Mackay on 581 and Bill Vaughan on 579. C class was won by David Henderson with 582 followed by organiser, Peter Gray with 576 and Karen Nilsen on 573. D class was won by Hugh Simpson (the young one!) with 579 from Lawrence Cooper on 568 and Jamie Cole-Hamilton on 565.

The Simpson boys cleaned up the pairs again with Hugh's score becoming 603 when adjusted for the handicap!

In the Grand Prix first stage Simon Clark and Alasdair Horne led the way with steady 592s, Simon qualifying in first place for the final on countback. Cliff Ogle's 591 put him in third with Donald McIntosh fourth on 589. The other main contenders for the series had mixed results, Barbara's 588 put her in 6th but only a point behind Donald going into the final. Jim unfortunately didn't make it through to the last 8.

Before the Grand Prix final was shot, the C & D Grand Prix final took place. After picking up points at each of the first three Grand Prix,

David Simpson was leading the series, closely followed by Sheena Sharp. Unfortunately nerves seemed to get the better of David and it was brother Hugh who won the final at Gagie with David failing to pick up any points. However, Sheena was unable to capitalise on this and managed only 5th place at Gagie and 2 points. This left her on 14 points for the series with David on......15. Gavin Walker finished third in the series with 12 points and Hugh Simpson's win at Gagie propelled him to 4th place in the series.

The main Grand Prix final was every bit as tense. Simon and Alasdair were neck and neck for most of the final and after 9 shots were tied for first place. Alasdair's 10.5 for his last shot was good, but Simon's 10.6 was better and he walked off with the whisky. Cliff was clear in third place but further down the range a battle was going on between Gordon Motion, Barbara Mackay and Donald McIntosh. With the series in the balance all was going well for Donald as he managed to stay ahead of Barbara. With no Jim C-H in the final all he had to do was to stay ahead of With two shots to go it Barbara to win. looked to be in the bag, but with shots of 9.6 and 9.7 his lead looked to be in danger. Barbara countered with 10.4 and 10.2 to finish in 5th place with two points and Donald finished 6th with one point. Those of you quick with figures will have worked out that this meant a tie for the series between Donald and Barbara.

Simon's win at Gagie moved him up to 3rd place in the series only a point behind Donald and Barbara and in spite of not picking up any points at Gagie, Jim finished fourth.

Both series have produced some close results this year and let's hope that the year 2000 will produce even more good competition.

The 1999 3P Grand Prix series produced a battle for first and second place over the 3 matches held over the summer.

The second match was held just after the end of the Scottish meeting and this improved the entry by adding 3 visitors from south of the border. A steady shoot from Martin Sinclair produced 1139 and another GB squad qualifying score for him. Second place went to visitor, Geoff McHugh with 1131 with Cliff Ogle third on 1125. With gaps in score like these it is still possible for the placings to be overturned in a 10 shot finals shot in the standing position. But on this occasion the finalists all shot similar scores and the result was unchanged. Lynda Sinclair won the 3x20 match with a score of 549.

The final event in August produced a poor

turnout. Donald McIntosh's score of 1127 with below par standing left him 4 points ahead of Cliff Ogle going into the final. Tony Credland finally managed to break his 1100 duck and moves into the expert category (after shooting about 4 1099's this season). Donald increased his lead in the final with a score of 97.4 which included 10s for his first 6 shots. Lynda Sinclair again won the 3x20 match with a score of 544.

Entry into our leagues from Scottish resident shooters indicates that there are a lot more 3P shooters out there who don't come to these events. These competitions are a good way of gaining experience and improving your standard and it is hoped that next year these events will be much better supported by the Scottish shooting community. The future of these events is in your hands.

Coaching

The first issue of TENpointNINE contained an article on the current coaching structure in GB.

In recent months there have been several requests for assistance from clubs requiring the services of a coach either on a one off or on a regular basis. Unfortunately there are very few coaches in Scotland who are either able or have the time to take up any of these enquiries.

As mentioned in the last article, SSRA is taking more of a co-ordinating role in organising GBTSF coaching courses in Scotland and has received a small amount of funding from sportscotland to assist with the costs involved.

It is hoped to run one or two basic level courses before the end of January for any interested parties. The location will depend largely on the applicants. The basic level course consists of one weekend of tuition by a qualified coach followed by an assessment.

It is important that all clubs have at least one person qualified as a coach even to help with the basics of brining novices into the sport. Many people have the necessary experience to allow them to do this technically quite well. What the course will help with is how to coach people in such a way that hopefully they will stay with the sport and progress gradually.

The cost is relatively low - £30 is a rough guide, but obviously this will depend on numbers attending and the location of the course. This is a good investment to help develop our grass roots shooters and hopefully the next generation of international shooters.

Anyone who is interested in taking a basic coaching qualification is asked to contact the Secretary as soon as possible.

European Police Championships 1999

Scottish Internationalist and double Commonwealth Games medalist David Rattray, recently took part in the Air Rifle event at the European Police Championships which were held in Munich, Germany at the end of August.

David is coming to the end of his first year as a fully fledged police officer after undergoing training and a probationary period with Strathclyde Police. It is therefore a measure of his abilities that he has achieved selection as a very junior officer.

Many of you may not be aware that, in many countries of the world, the only way to compete competitively as a target shooter is through either the armed forces or police force and so many of the top shooters in the world are coincidentally police officers.

David has trained hard all year for this match and his hard work paid off with a personal best score of 589 in his match which gave him a creditable fifth place. winner of the match was Hubert Bichler of Germany who is also one of their top internationalists of recent years, having competed at the highest level and who has won medals at World and European Championships. The winning score was 594.

This competition will have given David valuable match practice in his preparation for the Commonwealth Championships in November.

Outdoor Inter Region Match 1999

In an effort to drum up more entries for this competition, it was decided that it should be held concurrent with the Grampian Grand Prix held at Denwood on Sunday 29 August. As previously mentioned, this coincided with the unveiling of Adam Gordon's memorial and so a good entry was expected.

In the end 5 teams entered - Highland, Grampian, Fife, Central and Lothian. The competition was shot concurrently with the Open shoot which doubles as the first stage of the Grand Prix. Teams of six were entered with the best five scores counting towards the team total.

With the calibre of competitors within the teams, competition was expected to be close and it was. However at the end of the day, Lothian came out victors ahead of Central.

It is perhaps a good time to remind members that this competition was started after Bob Normand's untimely death from Cancer and the trophy was purchased from donations made in his memory. It does no harm to remember two of the strongest personalities our sport has experienced in the one day although it was of course, primarily Adam's day. The profit from the Inter region match will be donated to Cancer Research in memory of Bob which is in line with his family's wishes for the original collection.

British ISSF Championships 1999

The third British Championships to be run under ISSF rules were held over the weekend of 11-13 June on the Rimfire Range at Bisley. Four events are held - Men's and Women's Prone and 3P with all events except Women's Prone being decided after Olympic finals.

16 Members made the journey to Bisley. The first event to be decided was the Women's Prone. First place was a battle between Helen Vincent and Beccy Spicer on 591 and with Helen's 100, 100 finish being better than Beccy's 99, 100 finish, she took the trophy. Lynda Sinclair finished top of the 588s with a 100 finish. Barbara Mackay was extremely unlucky to have a bad round for her first shot which only narrowly made it onto the target. The shot lost her 6 points straightaway but she didn't drop any more in that string and fought on to the end to finish with 582 and 13th place. Janis Thomson also finished on 582 but with 15th place on countback. Susan Bell didn't have a good day and the less said about it the better.

In the Men's 3P match, Ronnie Sellar did his usual trick of not shooting for months and then winning big competitions. His 1143 was 9 points ahead of Ken Parr going into the final and although Ken shot and extremely good final, Ronnie managed to hold on to first place. Martin Sinclair finished in fourth place with Donald McIntosh in eighth. Mike

Rodigan, Tony Credland and Angus Jackson propped up the order but seemed to enjoy the experience. Tony and Angus have certainly improved since the event so let's hope for better performances next year.

The Women's 3P winner was a sure fire certainty. Beccy Spicer has shot extremely well this season, increasing the British senior and junior international records with a consistent series of performances. She was 10 points ahead going into the final and although her final was not as good as in previous years, she still finished well in front. Janis Thomson picked up third place and Lynda Sinclair finished seventh.

Finally in the Men's Prone 6 of the 11 members entered qualified for the second round of 24 competitors. Ronnie Sellar's 592 put him in second place going into the final but Simon Auldhouse shot strongly to pull up from fourth to second. Sinclair Bruce finished 6th, Martin Sinclair 7th and Bill Brown 8th.

Next year may be the last year that this event is held on Rimfire Range. Work on the new Bisley ranges is due to start shortly and it is hoped that they will be operational during the summer of 2000. Unfortunately, this is unlikely to be in time for the ISSF championships.

National Squads

During the 1998/99 season, it was the Association's intention to run three national squads.

Unfortunately due to a number of resource constraints and the likely impact of reorganisation of training at British level, the B squad never really got going.

It is SSRA's intention to have a more active B squad during the 1999/2000 season and a review of squad training and how the British squad situation affects this is underway. One suggestion is to integrate the training of all three squads to make best use of range time and coach availability. This will also have benefits financially as costs will be shared among a larger group of people.

All squad members must be individual members of the Association and membership forms can be obtained from the Secretary.

Our apologies go to those who applied for B squad membership this year, your names are held on file and your applications will be carried forward. Anyone else who would like to get involved in squad training should contact the secretary as soon as possible.

The Junior squad has met during the summer, but again has been limited by resources. Jim Hammond is currently in the process of contacting all existing squad members and those who have been identified as potential squad members. If there are any other juniors out there reading this, or if you know of any talented Juniors who would like to join the junior squad, please contact either the Secretary or Jim Hammond as soon as possible.

Clubs

The SSRA does not at present have any mechanism under its constitution for representing the interests of clubs and counties in Scotland.

It is also likely that there are clubs which are not affiliated to NSRA and are therefore falling through the net.

Also going on over the weekend are the British Championship 3P matches and here we fared much better. This year the matches were held on Melville, the former pistol ranges. The 3x40 or full course event was held early on Saturday while the half course or 3x20 was held on Sunday. Unlike international competitions, both events are open (although there is a confined British Ladies Sport Rifle Championship concurrent with the 3x20) and are shot in 4 classes.

Scottish shooters have frequently won the 3x40 match but unfortunately this year, Scots were unable to overcome the English and the best result was Donald McIntosh's fourth place. However, Scots also took a number of other placings. In the overall competition, Janis Thomson was sixth and won B class, Jonathan Hammond was third in B Class, Robin Law finished ninth overall and Tony Credland won C Class with Angus Jackson third. Martin Sinclair's absence was sorely felt in the Home Countries international match which is held concurrent with the 3x40 and for once England had selected a winning team. Scotland's score of 3359 was defeated by England's 3365. The England team did not however, include the winner of the competition, Iain Potts, who turned up at the range totally jetlagged after arriving home late the previous night from the USA and shot a personal best of 1144 after not picking up the gun for months!

In the 3x20 Donald finished third behind two

English ladies with a score of 570, a new Scottish Men's record, Janis won B Class, Tony won C Class and Ruth Ronnie of SRI won D Class.

In the aggregate competitions, several Scots were mentioned in despatches. Hugh Simpson, Bill Brown, Carol McKenna, Ally Aitken, Tony Credland, Sinclair Bruce, Mary Melvin, Hugh A Simpson, Graham Rudd, Mark McGechan, Gordon Cox and Jim Ward all received bars. However, in the Grand Aggregate, only 3 were able to take placings. Sinclair Bruce finished a creditable 5th in X class, Tony Credland was 5th in C Class and Hugh A Simpson was third in D Class and walked away with a shiny new Anschutz 1913 to boot. Unfortunately, some did not fare so well and Cliff Ogle was one of those demoted from X Class.

The highlight of the week for the individual competitors is the British Championship. The entrants (475 this year) are reduced to 20 in number over two stages shot in squads over a dewar course of fire. The final is over a double dewar and this year it was a tie for first place between Neil Day and David Scanlon. Neil won after a 20 shot tie shoot which had to go to a regauge. Best Scot was Jonathan Hammond who finished 8th= with Hugh Simpson only a couple of points behind but 13th=. Jonathan additionally picked up the Anschutz 1913 rifle (which his Dad is now "testing" for him!!)

In the team competitions only four Scots clubs were represented. Alloa came second in the weekend aggregate, E U Alumni A won the 3P, the Alloa pairing of Robin Law and Sinclair Bruce won the Open Club Pairs with Mike and Mary Melvin of Bon Accord taking third in the C & D Class section. Bon Accord won the sharpshooter with George Watson's College A losing in the semi-final.

In the Home Countries International Matches, Scotland's main team score of 3877 was only one point off the Scottish record, but was soundly beaten by a strong England team which shot a new British record score of 3904. The ladies also suffered defeat, in spite of setting a new Scottish record score, and not just at the hands of the English. Wales also crept ahead of us by 3 points. The Juniors yet again rescued us from a whitewash with a superb performance. The team of Jonathan Hammond, Graham Rudd and Neil Stirton

shot a British Record score of 1159, 12 points ahead of the English. This improves on the record they shot last year and with Jonathan, Neil and Simon still having a couple of years left at U21 level, lets hope they and the others who have made up the teams, can continue to reach record scores.

As many of you will know, there is to be a major redevelopment of the Bisley ranges over the next year in preparation for the 2002 Commonwealth Games. It is hoped by the time of next year's meeting, the new international facility will be open and available for use for some of the competitions. If you've never experienced the meeting, or haven't been for some time, then maybe next year would be the time to go.

Winter Competitions - conditions

The entry form for winter competitions is attached to the annual subscription form and an additional form is available for non members. All cartridge events are shot on NSRA 10 shot cards over 15/20/25 yards indoors. Air rifle events are shot at 10m on either NSRA 5 bull targets, 5 shot strip targets or ISSF single shot targets. Class averages re: A: 98.0+, B: 96.0 to 97.9, C: 93 to 96.9 and D: below 93.0

SSRA Medal competition for the Association Silver Medal - shot over two stages in 4 classes plus Junior and Veteran classes. The winner in each class receives a Salver with the Silver Medal to the top score overall. Each stage is a 3 card set (one hour). The top 10 (and equal) in the first stage contest the Final. Speedway for the Bill Dick Memorial Trophy and the Boston Bowl - shot in two classes -Open and C/D. The first round is 5 cards (not a set). The top 16 (any class) go through to a final to be shot in April 2000 in Perth. The best remaining 8 from C&D contest the C&D final. The final is a roundrobin event of 20 matches in groups of four. The top 8 eligible finalists in the A/B final are automatically selected for the annual postal match against lorth Island, New Zealand. The remaining 7

team members will be selected on the basis of performances during the indoor season.

CanDicap for the CanDicap Quaich is a CYOH competition (minimum handicap 5) restricted C and D class shooters. The first stage is a set of 3 cards (one hour) with the top 20 and equal scores qualifying for a postal final of a second set of 3 cards.

The Short Range 3 Positions Championship The year 2000 sees the introduction of a short range only championship. The competition is unclassed although prizes may be awarded to Junior depending on entry. The course of fire will be the aggregate of 2 half courses, one during each of 2 five week match periods in the first 3 months of 2000.

<u>Leagues</u> Divisions will be allocated on the basis of averages submitted. The points are allocated with the top scorer in each division being awarded n-1 points, second n-2 points etc where n is the number of shooters in that division. The Prone league consists of 2 cards during each of 8 match periods. The 3P and air rifle leagues consist of a half course/60 shot match respectively per month from November through to March.

Any queries, please contact the Secretary

in Scotland but to do this we need the help of County organisers and the clubs themselves. We would appreciate it if anyone out there who is involved with a County league association would provide SSRA with a list of your clubs and club contacts. This way we can contact the clubs as a first step to ensuring that support and advice is available to all clubs which need it.

In addition to this, the Association is reviewing the facilities planning document for Scotland for the next 5 vears. While one of the main targets for this period is the development of a national facility, there is also a responsibility to develop regional facilities and assist where possible development of facilities. Unfortunately at the moment there is no method of providing information to SSRA about proposed developments although we are told that Lottery bids should generally conform to a national facilities plan. It would therefore be extremely helpful if any club either considering actively or pursuing development of its facilities could provide the Secretary with some brief details so that this may be incorporated into the national plan.
